WATER CONTINUES TO RISE IN COLORADO; NO ALARM IS FELT

The Colorado river continued to rise during the last 24 hours, official gauge readings received by Six Companies, Inc., from Bright Angel station in the Grand Canyon showed an increase of 5,000 second feet over yesterday morning's figure. The river at that point has risen over 15,000 second feet in two days. Water from that point does not reach Black canyon for 20 hours, and estimates of the flow at the dam site are that a rise of 7,000 second feet over yesterday, has occurred. The river continued to rise during the day yesterday, and reached the highest levels for the season. Work is progressing unhampered, however, and no present concern is being given to danger of interference by high waters.

THREE TO APPEAR BEFORE FLOWERS

Joe Bagley, Albert Sittle and Albert Coty, charged with the possession of intoxicating liquor, driving while intoxicated and interfering with a government officer while in the performance of his duty, respectively, will be brought before United States Commissioner W. J. Flowers this morning for arraignment. Bagley was arrested by a raiding squad made up of Boulder City reservation officers under Chief of Police Glen E. Bodell, Wednesday night. The raiders confiscated 142 pints of beer and more than a gallon of whiskey.

On their way back to the reservation, they arrested Sittle on the drunken driving charge. They allege that he was driving in a wild and reckless manner, endangering motorists and pedestrians. Albert Coty was arrested by the reservation officers Tuesday night when he attempted to interfere with the duties of officers when they were raiding an alleged beer dispensary operated by Louis J. Berdow, who the officers arrested on an illegal possession charge.

When arraigned before Commissioner Flowers yesterday morning, Berdow entered a plea of not guilty and waived his preliminary hearing. He was held under a \$500 bond to answer to the charge in federal court. Louis Keller, arrested in the series of raids Wednesday night, also had his arraignment yesterday morning. The raiders allege that Keller was operating a beer garden 13 miles east of Las Vegas on the Boulder City highway. They confiscated 246 pints of beer and placed the defendant under arrest. Keller also entered a plea of not guilty, waived his preliminary hearing, and was released under \$500 bond to appear before the federal court.
