DINKY ENGINE GETS RESTLESS, RUNS AWAY WITH EMPTY TRAIN

For no good reason at all a dinky engine from which the boiler had been removed, one gravel car, a crane and two tank cars started from a siding on which they were spotted, and ran away on their own power Friday.

The start was so slow that none of the workmen at the Six Companies gravel plant, located but a few hundred feet from the track, noticed the moving cars as they slipped down the siding, which is built on a slight grade. Down the track the runaway cars raced and before they reached the end of the siding they had gained enough momentum to carry the whole train a considerable distance out in the loose desert sand.

Very little damage resulted from the freak accident as all of the cars remained upright and little difficulty was experienced in setting them back on the rails.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Garner, recently of Alamosa, Colorado, have moved to Boulder City and are living at 637 Sixth street.

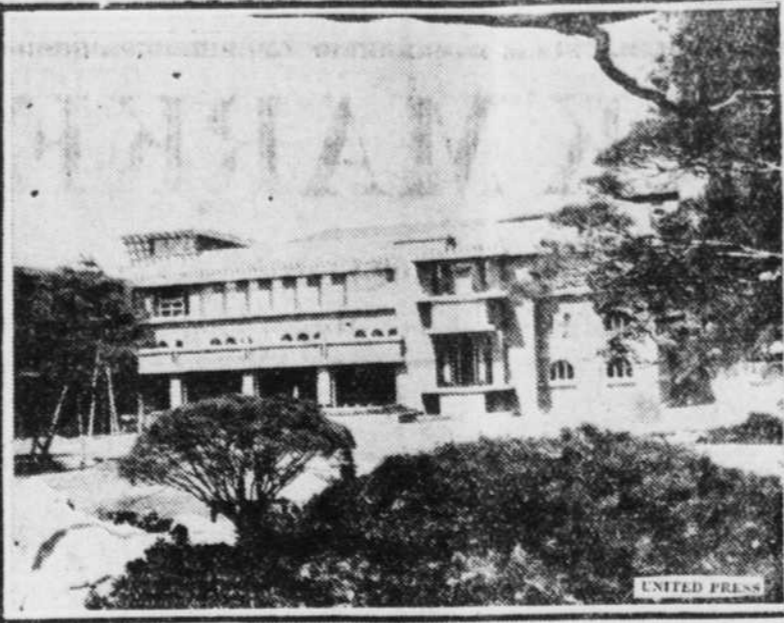

He was the fourth high Japanese dignitary done to death. A reign of terror was instituted in Tokio, co-incident with his murder.
