

PLANNED CLUB HOLDUP, SAYS GUN MAN

Charles Nelson, 37, alleged "two gun" bandit, confessed to having planned not only the robbery of the Red Rooster, Clark county road house, but the Boulder club as well, according to a statement released by police officers last night. He told officers that he had intended going to the Boulder club, backing a couple of their games, then, if unlucky, "hitting" the place. He also said that he then anticipated visiting the Red Rooster, as he had been told that a very large sum of money was kept there.

At a late hour last night Nelson still denied any knowledge of the holdup of the B. B. club, which occurred several weeks ago. However, his description tallies so closely, police say, with that of the bandit that escaped, officers think they will be able to prove conclusively that Nelson was the man, who in the company of 19-year-old Fred Corbin, held up and robbed the bartender and four patrons of the club.

Corbin is now in the state prison serving a 2 to 14 year term.

Nelson was arrested by Officer Louis Hord late Thursday night on the complaint of a private citizen who reported to Sergeant Jones that Nelson had approached him and told him of his plans to rob the Red Rooster. The informer signified his willingness to be a party to the holdup then at his first opportunity, warned the police.

Two guns were taken from the prisoner, a .25 calibre Colt automatic fully loaded, and an empty .32 calibre six-shooter.

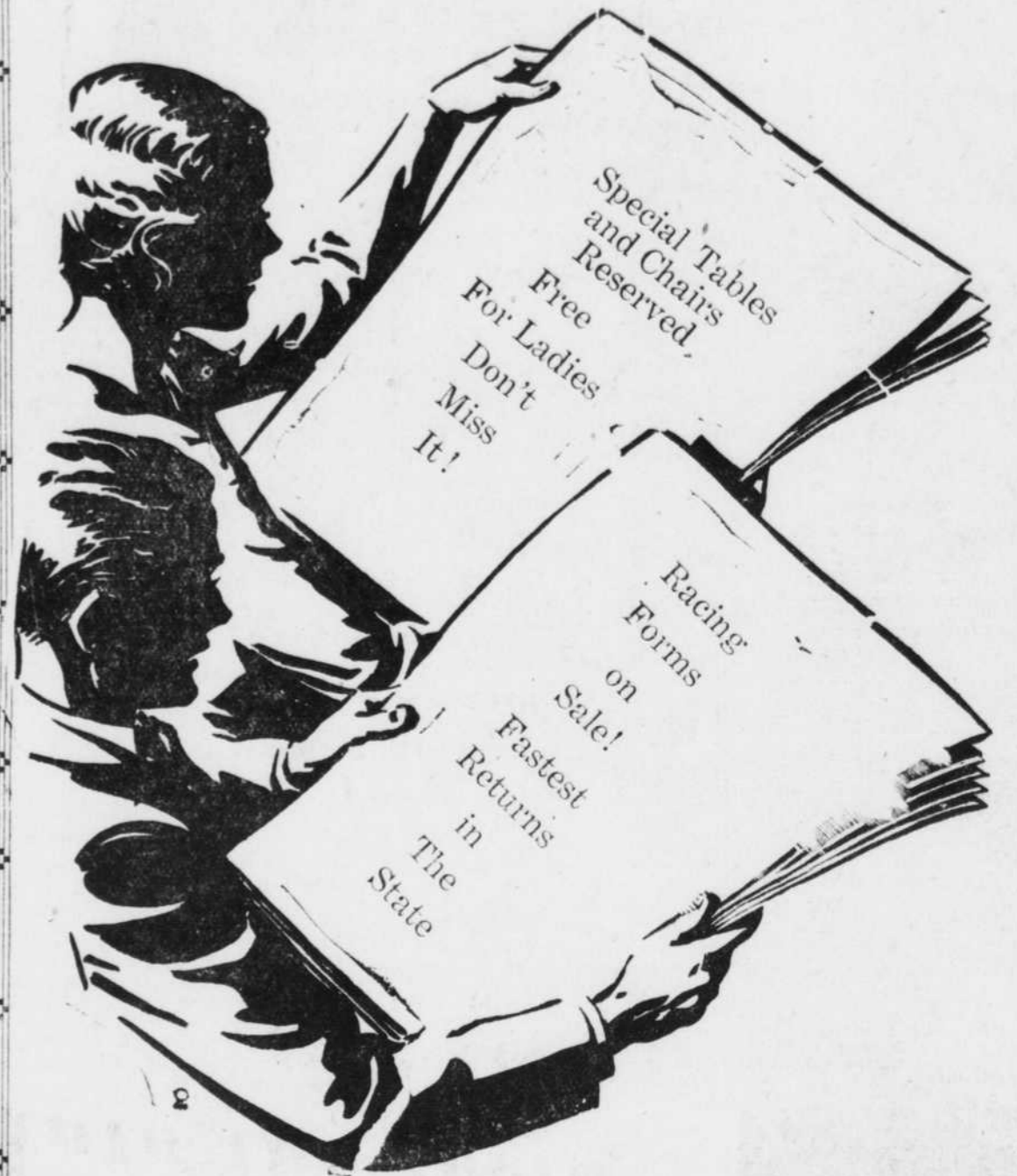

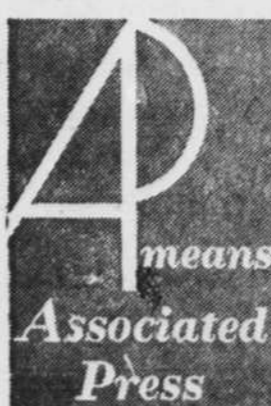
