AIR CONDITIONING EQUIPMENT TO BE INSTALLED IN BOULDER GOVERNMENT BUILDING SOON

The tormenting and energy-sapping heat that handicaps the engineers charged with the responsibility of pushing the \$125,000,000 Hoover Dam project through to completion within the next five years, is going to have a battle on its hands.

To relieve the government construction, field and office engineers, who must be on the job day after day in the 105 to 115 degree temperatures of the long Nevada summers, from the effects of the unrelenting climate, Uncle Sam has called into service the nation's most recently developed science, air conditioning.

R. F. Walter, chief engineer of the bureau of reclamation of the department of the interior, the man whose genius is woven into all the plans and specifications for the gigantic water conservancy and power project, today notified E. G. Biechler, president of Frigidaire corporation, of award of a contract to install air conditioning equipment in the government administration building here.

The administration building is the first project that has been termed by

nerve center in which the construction and engineering supervision of the project is concentrated.

Warned by several heat prostrations among the workmen during the blistering heat of 1931, the bureau of reclamation early this year called air conditioning engineers into consultation.

"Naturally, nothing could be done to lower the temperature of the outside air," Biechler said. "But we could give the key men on the project a cool and refreshing atmosphere for their offices and drafting rooms comparable to the invigorating summer climate of Colorado."

"The air conditioning engineers were faced with an extraordinary problem. In most localities 90 to 95 degrees is the peak during the summer and then for only a day or so at a time. In Boulder City the summer readings range up to 110 to 120 and there is no relief."

"It is an interesting fact that air conditioning, a new science and a new industry, has been drafted to assume a small but important part of a project that has been termed by

"The installation is the largest of air conditioning units to be installed thus far," Biechler said, which is especially fitting in view of the fact Boulder City is thoroughly modern and was built on plans accepted as the most progressive standards for city design.

Air conditioning will be placed in the offices of the construction, field and office engineers, the district counsel, chief clerk, two drafting rooms, two clerk's rooms, stenographic room and two rooms so far unassigned.

Engineers have planned the installation so the units will be out of the way and will not take up space needed for desks, filing cases, drawing boards and other office equipment. The condensing units will be installed in the service section of the structure and the usual copper tubing lines will carry the refrigerant to and from the conditioners.
