M'ADOO TO DO OWN TALKING

LOS ANGELES, May 28. (UP)—When William Gibbs McAdoo decides to change his views on prohibition and any other question, he himself will announce the change and no one else, he declared tonight.

This was his answer to reports that Dr. Z. T. Malaby of Pasadena, chairman of the Democratic state central committee and a Garner delegate to the national convention, had announced McAdoo is willing to support repeal of prohibition to gain the party nomination to the U. S. senate from California.

"When I have any declaration to make on any stand regarding national problems," he said, "I will announce it myself."

GARNER HITS HOOVER STAND

WASHINGTON, May 28. (UP)—The bitter feud over the federal relief program flared again today as Speaker Garner charged President Hoover with failure to cooperate in a non-partisan effort to bring relief to the masses of the nation. He indicated he would press for speedy enactment of his program entirely undismayed by the administration "pork barrel" attack, and with considerable expectation of Republican support.
