**BIG BUILDING Gables and Breaks In Outline
JOBS WILL BE COMPLETE SOON**
Give Both Variety And Comfort



Two Garages, L. D. S. Church, Soft Drink Stand Going Up.

The next ten days will witness the opening of at least three of the buildings now under construction and nearing completion. The A. C. Grant building, Fremont and Third streets, will be opened to the public on June 11. If present plans materialize.

This building, erected at a cost of between \$18,000 and \$20,000, will contain a large modern grocery store and meat market for Sewells Fried stores, a super-service station and the executive offices of the Grant organization. There will also be a tire shop, repair department and accessory sales office.

Of modern Spanish design in concrete block and stucco construction, the building will involve every modern feature known to the building trade in the Southwest. It was erected by the members of the Builders exchange of Las Vegas, and materials used were also purchased from members of the exchange.

The new garage under construction for the Cashman interests, on North Main near Fremont street, will be opened about June 10, according to a statement of the builders issued yesterday.

Having one of the largest floor areas of any garage of similar type in the Southwest, this new structure will be used as a display room for Buick and Pontiac automobiles, and repair shop. Estimates to cost between \$12,000 and \$15,000, the building is of concrete block and stucco construction and will be modern in every detail.

Construction work on a roof beer and refreshment stand adjacent to the El Portal theatre on Fremont street, was started last week. It will be completed within a few days and open for service. It is being built by Glenn Kennedy of the Fernon Drug stores. The name, "Dam Side Better Root Beer," has been copyrighted.

Rapid progress is being made on the erection of the Latter Day Saints church, at Ninth and Carson streets, and it is believed that the edifice will be completed long before the time called for in the contract. This church structure will be the finest ward chapel in Nevada. It is being built at a cost of \$49,000 and only the highest grade materials have been used in its construction.

The concrete exterior of the church will be plastered and finished in cream color. Steel window sash will be used throughout.

The building occupies a site 125 by 140 feet in size. It sets well above the street and lawn will slope in all directions from the building. Shrubs and vines will be used freely for decorative purposes on and about the building.

Actual work on the completion of the Las Vegas postoffice is expected to get under way late in June or early in July. The resumption of work on this building will be a boom to the entire building trades industry in this city. Local labor will be used exclusively and most of the materials will be purchased from local dealers.

Exalted Ruler Fred M. Stoller of B. P. O. Elks is successful in negotiating for financing of the tentatively planned new Elks temple, project, calling for an expenditure of \$75,000, will be gotten underway during the summer months.

According to records, Las Vegas is leading every city in the state in the amount of building permits issued thus far this year. If the steady and consistent building program planned for the ensuing year is carried out, Las Vegas will rate well up in the total building summary for the entire west, outranking many cities much larger.

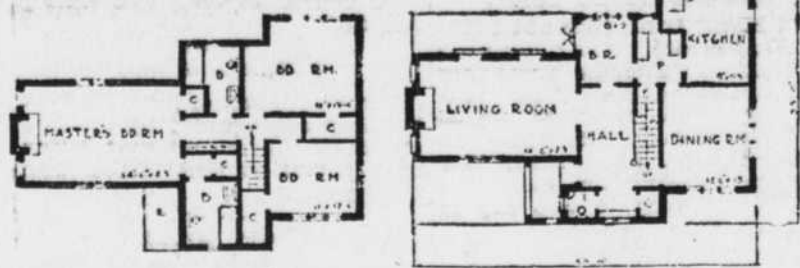
ART EXHIBIT AWAITS RAID

CHICAGO, May 28. (U.P.)—When and if the police get there, Gilbert Roches painting of a skyscraper should cause them to pause. From the windows citizens are hurrying to their deaths. On the street automobiles are mangling their passengers against lamp posts. Street cars are bumping into bodies on the tracks and on the top of the skyscraper is an electric sign which says "You Can Do It Better With Gas."

This masterpiece in oil, entitled "Aw What the Hell," has been given the place of honor in Chicago's famous no-jury art show which opens tomorrow and which the artists hope will prove a magnet for the "legions."

"It is a fine show," explained James Hannell, artist in Windsor necktie and flannel slacks. "But we are terribly disappointed because the police haven't raided us. Here we have assembled all our nudes and so forth and still the police haven't raided. If we don't get a raid pretty soon, nobody will come to see the show and then we'll be in a pretty pickle."

As Hannell pointed out and as the window washer indicated by his side long glances, the nudes should be enough to satisfy any morals squad. There is "The Pit," by Oscar Van Young, a picture of a young woman. That's description enough of



Distinction is gained by the gables over the projections or breaks in the plan of this house, and living conditions are improved also. These breaks are made to obtain sunlight or cross ventilation.

Space marks all the rooms, particularly the living room and master's bedroom. In each of these rooms there is a fireplace and four or five windows.

The house may be built on a lot 50 by 150 feet, with the living room facing the street and the dining room and kitchen looking toward the rear or garden. Materials would be brick for the lower half, stucco and half timber for the second story and slate for the roof.

Two walks may be laid to the entrance, one from the front and another from the left side. There would remain enough lawn or garden space, after the construction, to provide a proper setting for the house.

The cost of building this house is estimated at \$10,000 to \$12,000, depending upon the quality of materials and where it is built.

ENLARGE YOUR ROOM EASILY

Correct Paper And Furniture Increase Space



Old-fashioned wallpaper harmonizes with the 18th Century Furniture Prepared by the Decorators Club of New York for Las Vegas Age.

The decoration of a small room to make it seem more spacious needs great care in the selection of furniture and the treatment of the walls.

In the case of this small dining room, decorated by Ruth Lyle Sparks, the 18th Century English furniture—Sheraton table and sideboard, Hepplewhite chairs—is used as especially suited to the type of room.

The wallpaper, with the motifs in shades of green on a gray

background, is a copy of one found in an old house in Connecticut, and as the jade green stripe in the paper was too wide for the size of the room, the border was cut off and used only in the corners, around the ceiling line and above the wainscoting.

Thus the paper was made to conform to the size of the room, and, by the use of the jade borders, was arranged in panels.

Green shades of the paper are recalled in the trimming, shading from jade to very light green, used on the chaise longue curtains. The floor covering is black and white linoleum.

The other pictures range from abstractions which look like bed springs to a gigantic religious scene and some remarkable sculpture by Mrs. Maude Phelps Hutchins, wife of the University of Chicago's youthful president, Robert M. Hutchins. And as artist Hannell said: "You may think all this looks silly, but it isn't. These pictures express the innermost thoughts of some of the most promising artists in America, thoughts they could display on canvas and show nowhere else in the country but here, and as such they're worthy of respect."

The show will last a month, Hannell said, that is, if the blue coats come through with the necessary raid.

Exchange Roll Grows; Numbers 75 Per Ct. Of Contractors

Claiming to be one of the fastest growing organizations in the city, Las Vegas Builders' exchange is now fitting up a headquarters office at 105 south Main street, in the Sai Sagey hotel building.

Officers of the exchange report that fully 75 per cent of the local builders, sub-contractors and materials dealers are now members of the group.

Members of the exchange have set a program of diligently aiding in the observance and enforcement of the Las Vegas building ordinances. This work, they consider, is a benefit to the city's finances and greatly reduces the hazards of property owners becoming victimized by "fly-by-night" builders who operate without licenses or bonds, defrauding the city of revenue. These irresponsible "contractors" have been known to skip town after the first draw of money, and the builder is left holding the sack.

On the other hand, members of the group point out, the exchange member is generally a property owner, tax payer and at least a licensed operator capable of giving a bond equal to the amount of the job.

RISKY COURSE AT INDIANAPOLIS IS CHALLENGE TO 40

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 28. (U.P.)—The perils of the bumpy, treacherous Indianapolis speedway offered a challenge tonight to the 40 drivers who will roar away Monday after fame and fortune in the 500-mile Memorial day race, supreme test of motor engineering.

Against the urge for speed stands the reputation of the Indianapolis speedway as one of the most dangerous in the country. It was not built for speed—it was built for endurance, but automobile designers now are turning out products that are capable of both.

The result has been that tragedy already has ridden with the drivers. Two of them were killed while roaring around at better than 100 miles an hour in the qualifying trials. Others have been eliminated in the numerous less serious accidents.

The pace set in the qualifying trials gives promise of a real threat to the 500 mile record average of 101.12 miles an hour, which Peter de Paolo established in winning the 1925 classic.

The final tests on the 2 1/2 mile track today increased to 41 the number of drivers who met the speedway requirements of a speed of 100 miles an hour or better.
