DEER CREEK IS THROWN OPEN

Thrown open at last to the public, the Deer Creek Park, 30 miles from Las Vegas near Mt. Charleston, has been subdivided and lots are now on sale, according to the owners.

The Deer Creek district, 8,600 feet elevation and densely covered with trees, has been the dream project of several real estate promotion groups. However, none of the plans have ever been carried through before to completion, and the section is now to be placed on the market in 50 by 100 foot lots by the owners themselves.

Water is being piped to every lot from the mountain creek. Pressure is so great that it is being reduced and the overflow from the water mains fills the creek bed. Streets have been laid out by C. D. Baker, local engineer, all of them 30 feet wide. Roads are being built and will be improved, but are reported to be in fair condition already from the Tonopah highway to the park itself.

Cool and shady, the park is represented as being ideal for summer homes. Many of those who have recently visited it are highly pleased and it is believed that a large summer colony of Las Vegas people will grow there.
