### BOULDER PAYS HOMAGE TO WAR ST. ANDREWS MARTYRS IN MEMORIAL RITES HOLDS RITES

Residents of Boulder City observed Memorial Day in fitting style with a series of services and commemorative programs throughout the day, and during Sunday evening.

Harley A. Harmon, district attorney of Clark County delivered an address at the Memorial service held Sunday evening in the Community Church, attended by Legionnaires and citizens of the reservation and Las Vegas.

Father O'Grady of the St. Joan of Arc Church said High Mass at the services held by the newly opened Catholic church, yesterday morning. He was assisted by Father Hogan pastor of the St. Andrews Catholic church.

Four hundred and fifty Legionnaires, headed by the Legion band, paraded through the streets of Boulder City yesterday afternoon. The parade formed at the Legion

"shock" and the route of march led the veterans to the Municipal band stand. There they paid fitting tribute to those comrades who gave up their lives on the battlefields of France.

The parade was led by the Color Guard, followed by the Legion band, Spanish American War veterans, Ladies of the Legion Auxiliary, Legionnaires, Church and Civic organizations, Fraternal organizations and civilians.

Guy E. Baker, prominent Las Vegas attorney, delivered the Memorial address and deeply moved his audience with his stirring declaration of the honor and pride with which citizens of America should be imbued towards the American soldier who gave up their lives in the World War. Following Baker's address, the Legion Chaplain asked the benediction.

Following the Memorial Day services held in the St. Andrews Catholic church in Boulder City yesterday morning, the Reverend Father O'Grady, pastor of the St. Joan of Arc Catholic church in Las Vegas delivered the high mass, assisted by Father W. T. Devlin of Reno and invoked the blessing of the new organ presented to St. Andrews by the Holy Name society.

Father Hogan, pastor of St. Andrews, delivered the sermon and announced the official designation of the St. Andrews parish in Boulder City by the right Reverend Bishop Gorman of the Diocese of Reno. This marks the first designation of a religious parish in the Government reservation.

The high mass and memorial service were attended by officials of the government, city and six companies organization, as well as a capacity crowd of Clark County residents.

A special musical program was presented under the direction of Mrs. F. E. Carlin, assisted by Helen Miller, organist. The choir from the St. Joan of Arc parish sang a service.

### DAM PROJECT FAST BECOMING MECCA FOR WEEKEND TOURISTS

One thousand four hundred tourists visited Boulder City between 8:00 o'clock Sunday morning and 5:00 o'clock Sunday evening, according to a survey made by reservation officers. It is estimated that at least 2,000 visitors were on the reservation during the entire day.

This is a marked increase over the patronage of tourists over recent weekends and the authorities believe that with the Eastern vacation season approaching, the volume of tourist trade will increase steadily throughout the summer, reaching its apex late in August.

Parties from the Imperial Valley and Arizona, comprising approximately fifteen automobiles in each group, visited the reservation during Sunday and Monday.

W. H. Willis, 24, formerly of Ruth, Nevada, was killed almost instantly yesterday morning when he came into contact with a heavily charged wire while working on the Hoover dam project. All attempts to revive the stricken man proved fruitless.

The coroner's jury which held an inquest at the Palm Funeral Home last night, returned a verdict of "Death by accident while working in line of duty."

The deceased is survived by two brothers, W. W. Willis, of Las Vegas and J. R. Willis, of Ely. The body will be held at the Palm Funeral Home until this morning when it will be shipped to Ely for burial.

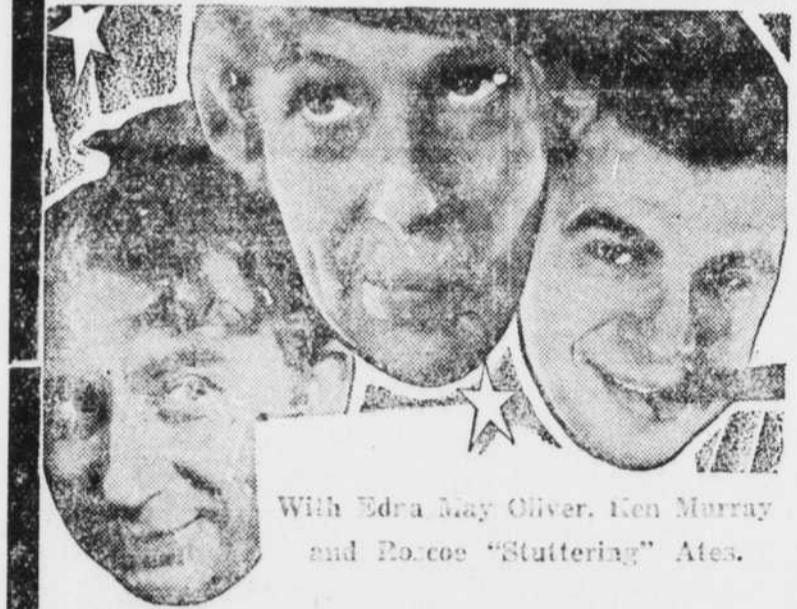
