

COLORADO BREAKS LEVEE NEAR BLYTHE; THREATENS RANCHES

BLYTHE, Calif., May 31. (AP)—Scores of volunteers worked in swirling waters of the Colorado river tonight to repair a wide break in a levee which threatened to flood 20,000 acres of farmlands and homes of more than 2,500 persons. A farmer discovered the 12-foot gap at Browns Headings, six miles more than 100 workers. The river was swollen to its highest stage northeast of here, and summomed since 1921 by recent heavy rains. A nearby road camp sent equipment to aid in placing sandbags along the broken levee. Other workers attempted to divert the flow from an abandoned canal which led directly to the farmlands. The canal was receiving the flow of water through the break. Repair leaders said they hoped to stem the gap before morning.

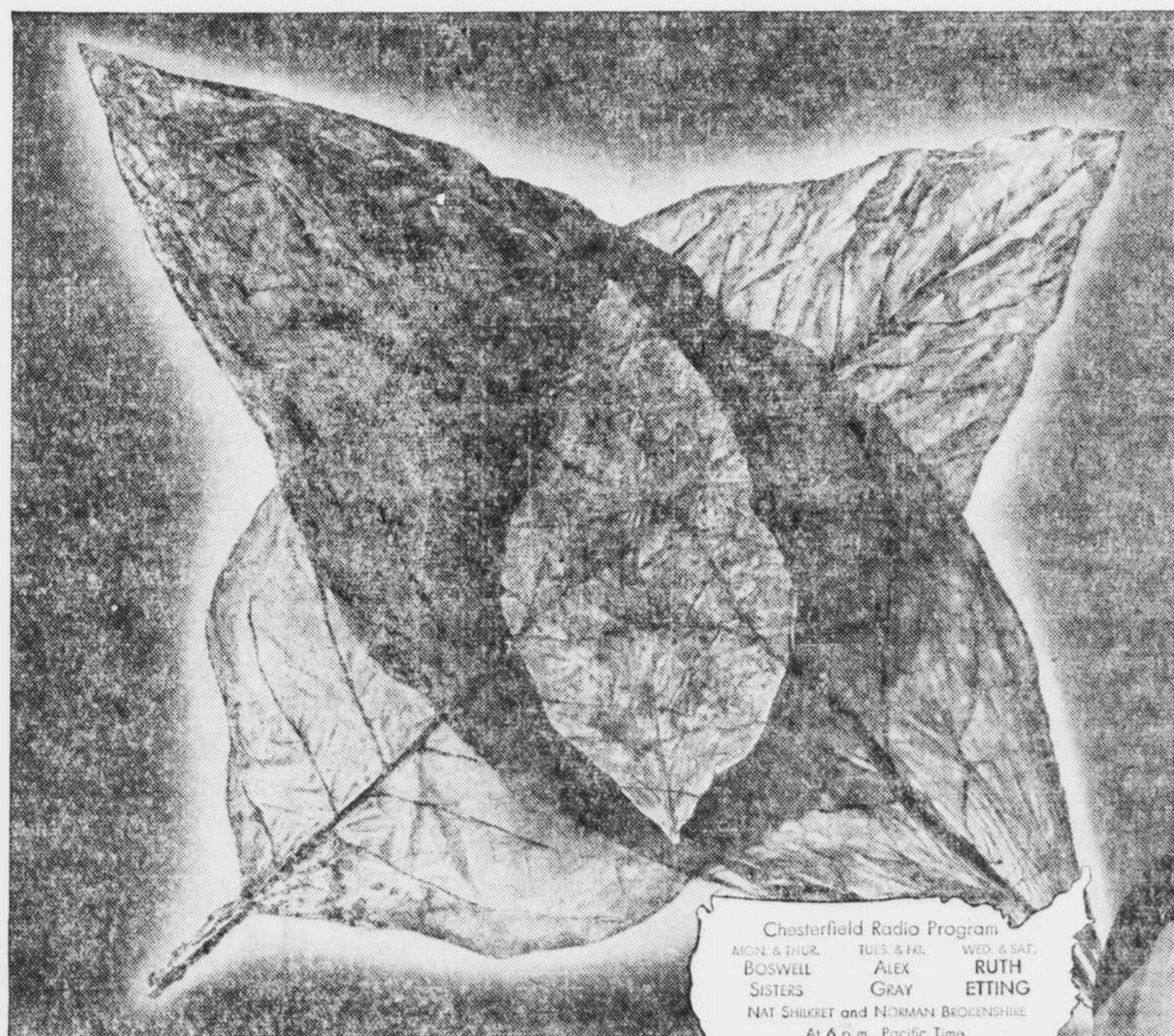
