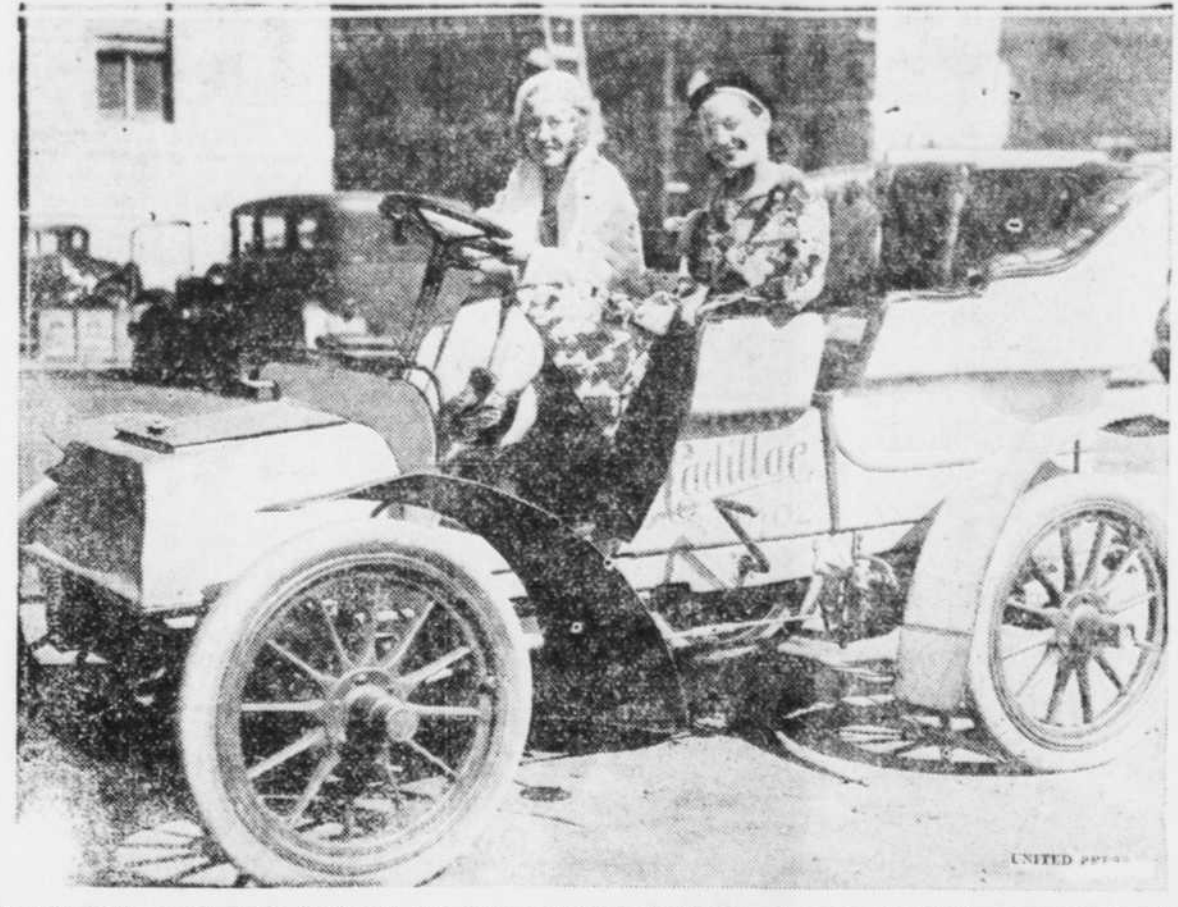

Ferris is survived by his widow, three step-children, and a number of brothers and sisters living in Taft, California. An aunt of Mrs. Ferris, Annie Geemen, who lives in Los Angeles, wired her niece that she would arrive here tonight, after being informed of the death. The body was taken to Las Vegas funeral home pending arrangements.
