MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By OTTO E. STRUM (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, June 1 (U.P.)—Favorable news from Washington of a billion dollar tax bill that could balance the nation's budget started a rush to cover in stocks when the opening gong sounded on the market today.

Steel topped from a high of 28 to 25 1/2, American Can from 40 to 35 1/2, Consolidated Gas from 38 1/2 to 33 1/2, American Tobacco B from 51 to 44, Woolworth 23 1/2 to 24, and Du Pont from 27 1/2 to 25 1/2.

Expectations of unsetting news from abroad, particularly Germany, as a result of recent political developments in that country, added to the motives for selling stocks.

Public utility stocks in general played follow the leader with Telephone, Public Service of New Jersey and Consolidated Gas were sold heavily and closed 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 points lower, respectively.

Some of the leading issues managed to hold on to some of their early gains and closing prices in American Can, Standard of New Jersey, General Electric, Allied Chemical and Woolworth were fractions to a point higher.

Bonds fared better than stocks and were no worse than irregular after their early buoy, being helped by expectations that a reported \$100,000,000 bond pool would swing into action this week.

Cotton reacted to heavy southern selling and foreign liquidation resulting from the suspension of a Liverpool commission house.

WEDNESDAY IN CONGRESS

Senate: Begun consideration of the omnibus economic bill.

Foreign relations committee urged American adherence to the world court to "avert the tragedy of war."

Chairman Norbeck of the banking and currency committee said the senate stock market inquiry would be resumed Friday.

Rep. Patman, Dem. Tex., introduced a resolution calling for an investigation of the nation's banking and currency system.

W. C. Fushing, representative of the American Federation of Labor, threw that organization's support behind the \$2,000,000 Garner relief plan in appearing before ways and means committee.

Judiciary committee favorably reported the Cochran bill to make interstate transportation of kidnapping victims a federal offense punishable by death.
