BREAK IN RIVER REPAIRED BY DESPERATE RANCHERS; STREAM RECEDING; 300 ACRES FLOODED

BLYTE, Calif., June 1. (U.P.)—A broken Colorado river levee which threatened to flood the fertile Palos Verdes valley was repaired by crews of desperate ranchers today as the swollen stream began slowly receding.

One hundred men remained to reinforce the 12-foot gap, while others brought word of their victory to women and children who had fled their valley homes when a flood seemed imminent.

Weary ranchers and workmen battled all night to repair the break, and by morning more than 500 had been recruited. Sacks were filled with sand and tossed into the gap while other workmen diverted the flood stream from an abandoned canal leading directly to the valley floor.

The river, swollen by unprecedented snowfall in the mountains to its highest stage since 1921, receded toward morning and gave the crews an opportunity to complete repairs.

During the first stages of the battle, the gap widened to 20 feet and a torrent of water flooded 300 acres in the valley. But the greater portion of the rich 20,000 acre valley with its homes, cattle and farm-lands, escaped damage.

Mothers maintained an all-night vigil ready to flee in automobiles at a warning of the flood. Many packed their belongings and with children went to Blythe. The break occurred six miles from here at Brown's heading.

At Houghton Lake, near Yuma, Ariz., Mr. and Mrs. Robert Daniels and Mrs. Juanita Ellison, negroes, drowned while attempting to ford the water on horseback.

GERMANY GETS NEW CABINET

BERLIN, June 1 (U.P.)—Lieut. Col. Franz Von Papen formed a new right-wing cabinet tonight, but appeared destined to meet an early defeat in the Reichstag.

The Papen government will be tolerated by the nationalists and Fascists, but the Catholic center party announced it would oppose the new regime because it is an inadequate solution of the crisis caused by resignation of Chancellor Heinrich Bruening. Bruening is the Catholic party leader. Colonel von Papen is a member of the party's extreme right wing.

As a result, the new cabinet may be defeated at an early date. The Reichstag probably will be dissolved and new general elections held in July or August.

The Fascist party or Adolph Hitler, which renewed its riotous demonstrations in the streets during the political negotiations today, expected to come into complete power as a result of the new elections.

The new government is made up chiefly of aristocrats with a strong military representation. President Paul von Hindenburg approved the list of ministers when it was presented by the chancellor-designate tonight.

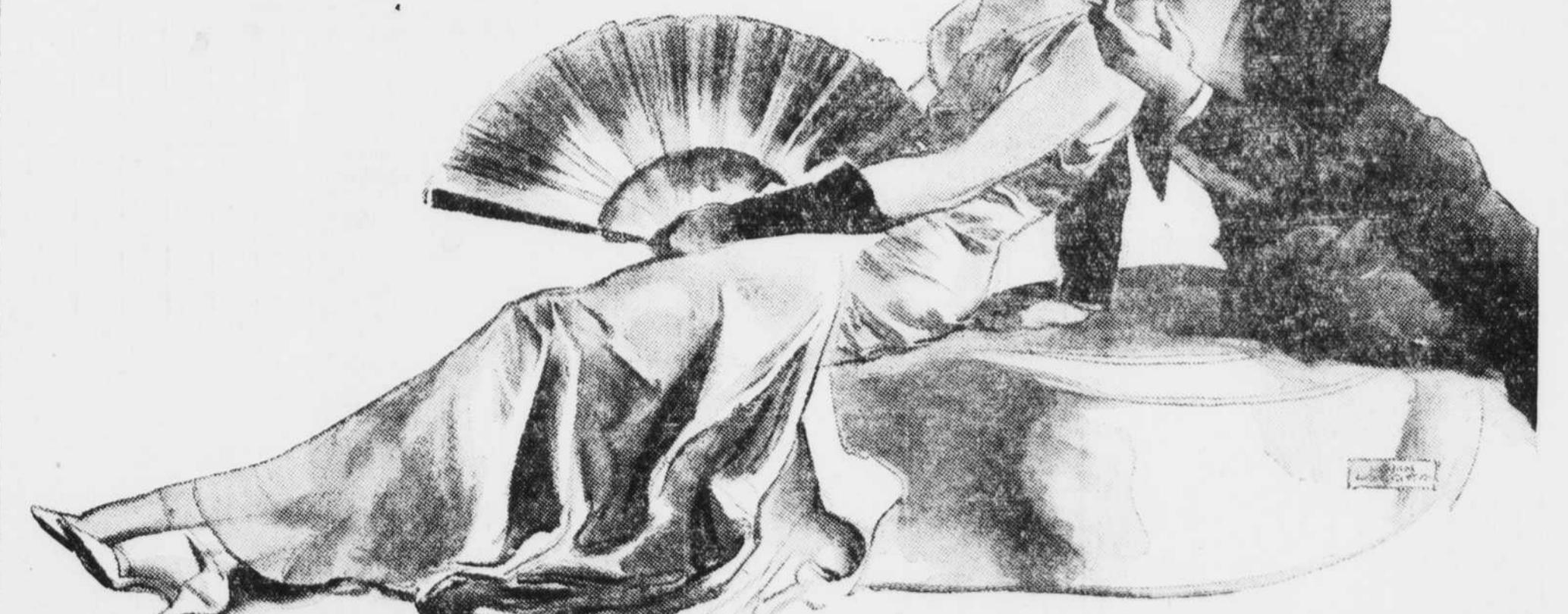
