APRIL THE FIFTH WINS DERBY: **CROWD STUNNED; 50 MILLION CHANGES HANDS ON BIG RACE**

(U.P.) - April the fifth, a sleek brown colt with deep chest and proudly-held head, streaked across the finish line a winner in the 153rd derby today, to the plaudits of the King and Queen and some halfmillion of their subjects.

Another outsider had taken the world's greatest horse race. The crowd, stunned at the failure of Orwell, the 5 to 4 favorite, hardly rallied enough to give the winner the accustomed ovation,

April the Fifth finished threefourths of a length in front of the Aga Kahn's Dastur, which was a nose ahead of Lord Roseberry's Miracle. Far back came Orwell, thoroughly beaten.

Aside from the race itself, which rane. had the usual thrills, the spectacle of what seemed like half of England disporting itself over the fivemile area around the track presented a sight seldom equalled anywhere in the world.

The entire royal family and the nobility in the stands and enclosures rated no higher than the Arrys and 'Alfs and their broods sprawled over the Downs, eating pork pies or fish and chips, patronizing the gypsy fortune tellers, or giving ear to the vociferous army of touts.




