THEY'RE RIVAL KEYNOTERS

Republicans And Democrats Pick Party Stalwarts In Dickinson And Barkley To Fire Opening Guns



WASHINGTON, (AP)—Republican strategists, choosing a keynoter for their national convention, have given an Iowan the same mark of recognition that Democrats, likewise engaged, accorded a son of the blue grass state.
Whatever the contrasts between Senator Lester J. Dickinson of Iowa and Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, the experience of each as a stalwart in his party apparently was weighed in the choice.
So, as the Democrats were choosing for their temporary chairman, an "iron man" campaigner with a 20-year record of capital service, Republicans were reaching a long arm into the midwest to designate a veteran Republican whom many farm-minded partisans regard well qualified to maintain the party's principles of agricultural protection.
Here are brief sketches of the men who will preside over the opening deliberations of their respective party conventions in Chicago:
ALBEN W. BARKLEY
Kentuckians call Barkley the "iron man." A dozen speeches daily find this aggressive fighter of 54 ready with the same vim that carried him into his first elective office, that of county prosecutor.
Barkley's political contacts were made first as a court reporter, after mastery of the law following a college course that included farm-tenancy tending to pay his way.
His political philosophy holds that the people, despite their shortcomings, are able to master their own destinies and remedy the evils of democracy.
Abolition of the "lame duck" session, only recently accomplished, was the aim of the first bill he introduced after entering congress as

During a 20-year service "on the hill" the Adamson eight-hour law, the 1920 transportation act and the railway labor act were partly his creation, and interstate commerce legislation constituted his chief interest.

LESTER J. DICKINSON

Senator Dickinson's record as a sponsor of movements to protect agriculture is a long one.
During his last eight years in the house he was leader of the farm bloc and encouraged amendments that increased greatly the annual expenditures for agricultural colleges, extension services and experiment stations.
When the Fordney-McCumber tariff bill was being framed his voice was raised in a fight for increased agricultural rates, and in 1930 when he conducted the Iowa defense of the Republican Hawley-Smoot tariff, he saw his Republican comrades in neighboring states go down to defeat while, for his own part, he advocated protection.
His argument before rural questioners was that manufacturing centers must be kept prosperous if they were to buy the products raised by the farming areas.
As for direct aid to the farms he is credited with help in bringing about the war finance corporation's refinancing of mortgage loans on

He ran from the bank, jumped on his horse and rode away amid a fusillade of shots from the guns of citizens who had learned a bank robbery was in progress.

OMAHA, Neb., June 1. (AP)—Officials of the national balloon races waited tonight for exact measurements of the distance between Omaha and Hatton, Saskatchewan, Canada, to learn whether a new record had been set in the race which ended today.
The army balloon No. 2, piloted by Wilfred F. Paul and Lt. J. H. Bishop, landed in the woods thirteen miles north of Hatton. It was the last of the six balloons to come to earth after they left here Monday night.

BLAST ON BOAT FATAL TO TWO

WASHINGTON, June 1. (AP)—Admiral M. M. Taylor, commander-in-chief of the Asiatic fleet, advised the Navy department today that an explosion on board the gunboat Tulsita at Amoy, China, had resulted in the death of one member of the crew and the wounding of 12 others.
