

LEFTY GOMEZ AND HACK WILSON SHARE HONORS IN MAJOR PLAY

By JACK CUDDY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, June 2. (U.P.)—Senior Lefty Gomez, sensational young Castilian hurler of the New York Yankees, and rotund Hack Wilson, Brooklyn's slugging outfielder, shared honors today in major league play.

The slender Gomez registered his ninth mound victory in ten starts as his New York Yankees trounced the Philadelphia Athletics, 5 to 1. The A's lone run came in the second inning, preventing Gomez from chalking up shutout No. 3 for the season.

Wilson, the former home run monarch of the National league, returned to championship form by blasting out two four-baggers as the Dodgers split a double header with the second-place Boston Braves. The split enabled Brooklyn to replace Pittsburgh in fourth position in the National circuit.

Wilson won the first game, 6 to 1, and lost the nightcap, 5 to 1. Hack's first homer came in the seventh inning of the opening contest, with O'Doul on base. He drove out the second four-bagger in the ninth inning of the closing encounter, preventing a shutout by Boston.

Bobby Brown, Boston pitcher, won his third victory over the Dodgers in the nightcap. In thirty-three innings he has allowed Brooklyn only three runs and 14 hits.

The Pittsburgh Pirates tumbled into second division by losing, 9 to 5, to the leading Chicago Cubs. Woody English and Riggs Stephenson led the Cubs at bat. English drove out two doubles and two singles in five times up. Paul Waner continued his brilliant bat wielding for Pittsburgh, garnering a homer, a double and a single.

The Phillies' doubleheader at New York was washed out. Cincinnati at St. Louis will be played

in a twin bill Sunday. As the Yankees lightened their lead in the American league by downing the A's, Washington took a firmer hold on second place by winning both ends of a double-header from the lowly Boston Red Sox, 6 to 4 and 8 to 1. This charged the Sox with 35 defeats in 42 starts. Weaver and Marberry limited Boston to seven hits, one of them a home run by Smead Jolley, in the first game. The Senators pounded MacFayden for 14 safeties. Joe Cronin drove out a homer for Washington in the nightcap, in which Bob Burke yielded only seven hits to Boston, while Durham, Moore and Michaels were found for ten.

The St. Louis Browns bunched five of their eight hits in the third inning for four runs to defeat the Chicago White Sox, 4 to 2. Thomas, Gregory and Faber yielded eight hits to the Browns, while Dick Coffman allowed Chicago ten scattered safeties.

Cleveland's doubleheader at Detroit was washed out.

ATHLETES TO ARRIVE SOON

LOS ANGELES, June 2. (U.P.)—More than half of the 2,000 athletes participating in the Olympiad from foreign nations will be in training here by the middle of this month, officials said today.

First to arrive will be the India delegation June 11, followed by Australia June 22, Holland July 3, England, Canada and South Africa July 21, Switzerland June 23 and Denmark July 24.

Other nations of the 50 in the games have not reported arrival dates.



JACK DENIES NEW ROMANCE

RENO, Nev., June 2. (U.P.)—While Reno buzzed with rumors of a probable marriage Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion, insisted tonight that "romance" was far from his thoughts and that Lina Basquette, brunette screen and stage dancer, was merely a "very good friend."

Miss Basquette, who previously called herself Rosita Gonzales, was seen with Dempsey frequently during a California visit. Then Dempsey returned to Reno, which he calls home, and immediately Miss Basquette came here for a rest.

"I needed the rest and Jack, as a friend, told me Reno was an excellent place in which to spend a vacation," Miss Basquette was quoted as saying.

"She wanted a vacation and I told her about the outdoor recreational opportunities in western Nevada," Dempsey amended guardedly.

"Fishing to me is great sport," Miss Basquette said. "I like to ride horseback also."

WALKER CASE WILL BE LEFT ON DOORSTEP OF ROOSEVELT, JUST BEFORE HE ASKS NOMINATION

NEW YORK, June 2. (U.P.)—The delicate political question of Mayor James J. Walker's removal from office, offering of the Hofstadter committee's investigation of the New York city government, will be left on the door-step of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt.

It will be left there, in all probability, shortly before the governor makes his bid for the Democratic presidential nomination, and also probably without any suggestions, instructions, or demands concerning its disposition.

Samuel Seabury, counsel for the committee, is said to believe that the record, the volumes of testimony now completed, and the circumstantial evidence linking Walker to unexplained and gigantic funds, should be sufficient to bring definite action from the governor.

Any charges brought against Mayor Walker would fall within two classes. It was pointed out today in legal circles.

Walker could be charged, as Seabury pointed out to the committee, with violation of the city charter for possession of securities in a concern holding a contract with the city. Several precedents for removal on such grounds are in the record.

Or the mayor could be charged, more generally, with having accepted gifts from persons who might expect favors in return, and with having violated the "standard of conduct set for public officials" by the governor himself.

A review of the accomplishments in New York's political housecleaning during the 21 months in which Samuel Seabury has been engaged in his investigations shows many tangible results.

Actually there have been two separate inquiries. The first, begun 21 months ago under an order of the appellate division of the state court, with Seabury as referee, applied only to the magistrates' courts.

But out of that investigation grew the major inquiry, authorized by the state legislature, with Seabury as counsel to a legislative committee, which has provoked nationwide interest in view of its possible influence upon national politics.

Briefly summarized, the results of the first investigation were these: Three city magistrates resigned

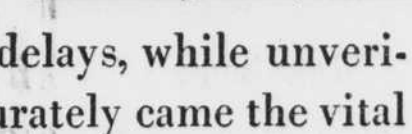
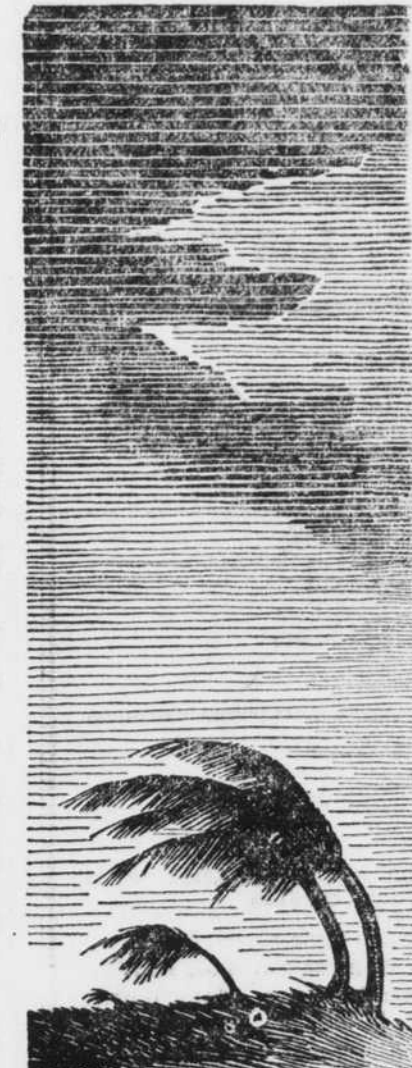
Into the teeth of a Hurricane
