SEEK RELEASE
OF RUM SHIP

LOS ANGELES, June 2. (U.P.)—An appeal for release of the French brig Quand Meme, its crew of eight men and a \$75,000 liquor cargo from custody of the Mexican government at Ensenada was made today to Dr. Henry Didot, French consul here, by Capt. Claude Garon.

Didot said he was informed Capt. Garon put in at Ensenada to avert a mutiny which threatened when seamen learned they would not receive their pay. The brig had waited off the southern California coast several weeks in an asserted attempt to dispose of its cargo of choice wines to liquor runners.

MOTHER SEEKS
AVIATOR SON

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., June 2. (U.P.)—The mother of Arthur Sullivan, missing Newfoundland pilot, departed today for the northeast coast to aid in the search for her son and Dr. K. Karl Kuehnert of Illinois, who have not been reported since they started on a brief flight along the coast on Memorial day.

The two fliers are being sought by motor boats in the St. Anthony region. A monoplane from Boston also is scheduled to join in the search. The missing men are members of the Grenfell mission at St. Anthony.

TO TRANSFER
WORLD MEET

WASHINGTON, June 2. (U.P.)—Prospects of an early international attack on the world depression were brightened today when the administration indicated approval of the British plan to transfer the economic phase of the Lausanne conference to London.

This procedure, it was believed, might speed up the conference to early July. Otherwise it might not be held until late August as the British will be occupied with the Lausanne meeting until July and during that month with the imperial conference in Ottawa.

FACES ACTION

PASADENA, Calif., June 2. (U.P.)—Thomas D. Campbell, of Pasadena and Montana, noted as the world's biggest wheat farmer, was named defendant today in a suit demanding payment of a \$16,590 promissory note.

The suit was filed by James S. MacDonnell, president of the First National Bank of Pasadena, who said he loaned Campbell the money last September without security and that the rancher failed to repay it on demand.

EXPENSES OF
CONGRESS HIT

CHICAGO, June 2. (U.P.)—Unless congress cuts its expenses immediately, agreed 500 of America's prominent business men today, "the checks of the federal government will be printed on rubber."

It expresses the sentiments of all the business executives from twenty-one states who are attending the national tax conference sponsored by the Chicago Association of Commerce in the gilded ballroom of the LaSalle hotel.

JURY TURNS
UTAHAN FREE

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 2. (U.P.)—Clarence J. Elder, 36, was found not guilty today of murdering James L. Beveridge, March 23, by a jury of twelve men.

The jury had been out less than two hours when it returned the verdict—one of six given them in instructions by District Judge Roger I. McDonough. The other five were: Guilty of first degree murder; guilty of first degree murder, with recommendation for leniency; guilty of second degree murder, and voluntary manslaughter.

Elder was charged with fatally shooting Beveridge in the latter's home, climaxing a marital tangle. During the trial, Mrs. Myrtle Elder spared no details in her testimony revealing her asserted indulgence in a clandestine olive affair with the dead man.

FIND BODY OF
PROSPECTOR

ASPEN, Colo., June 2. (U.P.)—W. C. (Billy) Chisholm, who for more than 50 years searched the mountains of Colorado for gold, is dead. His body was brought to Aspen today. W. C. Tagert of Aspen and R. F. Zacker of Denter found him Wednesday stretched across the long dead ashes of his campfire.

He was believed to have died several months ago from starvation and exposure.
