



BATTLING MARK BROKEN BY GEHRIG

NEW YORK, June 3. (U.P.)—One modern major league batting record was broken, two all-time records were equalled and two were approached today as the New York Yankees defeated the Philadelphia Athletics, 26 to 13.

Lou Gehrig hit four home runs in consecutive times at bat, equaling the major league record for home runs by one player in one game, and establishing a new modern major league record for consecutive home runs in one game by one player.

The Yankees hit seven home runs, equalling the major league record for home runs in one game. The two teams amassed 36 hits for a total of 77 bases, two short of the major league record of 79.

The two teams got nine home runs, falling one short of the major league record. In addition, Babe Ruth hit his fifteenth home run of the season; Jimmy Foxx his nineteenth, and Gehrig's string was run to 11.

Nine pitchers were used—five by the Athletics, who started with George Earnshaw.

Gehrig blasted out his homers in the first, fourth, fifth and seventh inning. Ruth got his four-bagger in the fifth and Earl Combs did likewise in the same frame.

Tony Lazzeri drove out a four-bagger in the ninth. Foxx made his circuit drive in the ninth inning, and Cochrane of Philadelphia garnered one in the first frame.

The Yankees won the contest with a six-run rally in the ninth inning. Allen, Rhodes, Brown and Gomez performed on the Yankees mound, while Earnshaw, Mahaffey, Walberg, Krause and Rommell pitched for the A's.

When Gehrig drove out his four home runs, he duplicated the record-equalling feat performed Wednesday by Buzz Arlett of the Baltimore Orioles, home run king of the International league. The record was established originally in 1894 when Robert Lowe of the Boston Nationals hit four homers during one game. In 1896 Ed Belahanty of the Philadelphia Nationals did likewise. In the minor circuits, George Kelley of Rochester duplicated the feat in 1919, and in 1923 John Killepsie of the Bridgeport Eastern league equalled the performance.

West Ferrell won his own game when he homered in the fifth frame of the first contest with Montague on base. In the nightcap, the Indians took advantage of poor pitching by Wyatt, Herring, Goldstein and Hogsett to win.

Two home runs, one in the first and another in the tenth inning, gave the St. Louis Browns a 2-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Rain played havoc with the National league schedule, only two games being played. The Boston Braves nipped the Brooklyn Robins, 6 to 5, and the Pittsburgh Pirates nosed out the Chicago Cubs by the same score in 11 innings.

500 ATHLETES IN STAGG MEET

CHICAGO, June 3. (U.P.)—Nearly 500 athletes from 113 schools in 20 states will participate in the 28th annual Stagg national interscholastic track and field meet at the U. of Chicago tomorrow.

The entry list of 496 is only 12 short of last year's total, but the quality of the competition promises to be the best in the history of the meet.

Every track record in the meet is in danger of being broken under the onslaught of high school stars, many of whom are bettering college performances.

Several of the prep school stars are Olympic possibilities, the most notable of this group being Amsten Oliver, lanky negro from Rosemead, Calif., who won both hurdles races last year. His time of 23.5 in the 220-yard low hurdles set the present meet record.
