

Chilean President; Revolt

At Santiago Is Bloodless



SANTIAGO, Chile, June 4. (U.P.) -The government of President Juan Esteban Montero was overthrown tonight by a military uprising.

The president and his cabinet left Lamoneda, the presidential palace, and the revolutionary junta, led by Carlos Davila, former ambassador to Washington, took charge.

DRAMATIC EASE

The overthrow of the government was accomplished with dramatic ease. While everyone was expecting armed action, a group of rebel leaders, comprising Davila, Col. Arthuro Memina Benitez, Gen. Puga Ossorio, Eugenio Matio and Col. Marmaduke Groce marched unopposed to the palace and delivered their ultimatum to Montero and his cabinet.


The president, recognizing that the rebels were supported by a majority of the arms, accepted the inevitable and stepped out, although he did not resign.

When the rebels entered the presidential quarters, they found Montero surrounded by all his cabinet and under secretaries. The president, who was outwardly alm but obviously trying to suppress nervous excitement, silently ack-nowledged the salute of Col. Grove. 
