WASHINGTON, June 4. (U.P.)—The federal budget balancing tax bill moved a long step nearer final enactment today, when the house approved the completed \$1,119,000,000 measure without even the formality of a record vote.

Member after member rose in his place to attack the bill. The bill, called the most drastic of all peace time revenue measures, will be before the senate Monday, with the leaders confident that "an afternoon" will see it approved and sent to the President for signature.

BONUS ARMIES GATHER MANY ADHERENTS IN CAPITAL TREK

WASHINGTON, June 4. (U.P.)—The ragged army of World War veterans encamped in Washington seeking federal aid tonight had hope, but little else, for nourishment.
