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COMMUNITY INTEREST

WE HAVE heard an occasional sour note when the relations of Las Vegas with Boulder City have been under discussion. In both places we find an occasional individual who is inclined to resent the existence of the other.

It seems to The Age that there is no occasion whatever for strife between the two communities. There may be some divergence of interest in business circles, but that cannot be reconciled by bitterness.

Rather, it would be wise for us of Las Vegas to extend a helping hand and a friendly word to our Boulder City neighbors. Whenever human beings gather together there are created ties of common interest. We are dependent upon each other to a far greater degree than we realize.

Boulder City and Las Vegas can be mutually helpful to each other, or harmful in our relations. If a friendly disposition is encouraged both will benefit. If contentions and jealousies are permitted to cloud our relations both communities will be harmed.

Each community has what the other needs. If a spirit of friendly cooperation prevails both will profit by the mutual exchange of interests which inevitably must follow.

Only twenty-two miles apart, with an excellent paved highway connecting the two cities so that they are only 35 or 40 minutes apart, regular driving time, Las Vegas and Boulder City are really one community. Each has its separate character and its separate functions, but together they cement into one harmonious whole.

TOURISTS AN ASSET

ACCORDING to Nye Wilson, secretary of the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, 190,000 travelers passed through Las Vegas during the year 1931.

It is estimated they spent \$1,900,000 in this city, a tidy sum, sufficient in itself to justify the existence of a prosperous little city.

That would be an income of approximately \$160,000 per month or \$40,000 per week or nearly \$7,000 a day.

The estimate is, we believe, reasonably accurate. It contemplates the expenditure of ten dollars for each person who comes. A few of them stop only long enough to buy gas and oil and a bite to eat. Others stop overnight, have several meals, a hotel room, go to the picture show, have some laundry done, buy the local papers, visit Boulder City and Hoover dam, and average considerably more than ten dollars expenditure.

Whatever the exact figure may be, it is obvious that tourist travel is of tremendous value to Las Vegas. It ought to be carefully encouraged and nurtured. Las Vegas could with vast profit expend \$5,000 a month through its Chamber of Commerce in building up its tourist travel. And for every dollar so spent, ten dollars in real money would return.

Our people seem not to realize that Las Vegas has the most perfect setting to attract travelers of any place in the west today. And we are not living up to our opportunities.
