TEN-YEAR-OLD TEACHES TO FINANCE CAREER

TUCUMCARI, N. M., June 3. (AP)—Because 10-year-old Louis Muckelroy wants to be a "second Paderewski" he has been teaching a class in piano for a year and a half.

Louis gives each of his dozen pupils one private lesson weekly, then conducts one class lesson a week in music reading. Several of the students are older than their teacher.

Louis, who has won several music festival contests, began his career as instructor at the behest of mothers who heard of his success in teaching a playmate.

He is paid on the same basis as other local music teachers and is saving his money to forward his own study.

RECORDS FALL IN BAY MEET

KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, June 4 (U.P.)—Two world records and one Olympic mark were broken and two other world records tied as individual stars led the field of 150 competitors in the annual Pacific association track and field championships today.

"Blazin' Ben" Eastman, slim, bespectacled middle distance star Stanford University, shattered two world records in one race when he breasted the tape at the end of 800 meters in 1:50 and continued a few more paces to the 880 yard mark in 1:50.9.

Officially he was running the 800 meter race, and was concentrating on lowering the mark of 1:50.6 held by Sera Martin of France. Eastman already had set a new world record of 1:53.3 in the 880 this season.

He collapsed at the finish of the fastest half mile ever recorded for a human runner, but he recovered quickly and was anchor man for Stanford in the 1600 meter relay. In that race, he was 20 yards behind Houvar of the Olympic club at the start of the last lap, but he overtook his opponent and nosed him out by three yards at the finish. Eastman ran that 400 meter lap in 46 seconds flat, one second faster than the world's record for the 400 meter race, but he had a running start.

PAY CUT KEPT IN RELIEF BILL

WASHINGTON, June 4 (U.P.)—A ten per cent salary cut which affects all federal employees from congressmen to janitors rode into the \$238,000,000 economy bill today behind a solid phalanx of senators which swept aside amendment after amendment and allowed exemptions only for those workers receiving less than \$1,000 a year.
