LOS ANGELES CIVIC LEADERS TO VISIT DAM PROJECT TODAY

Twenty civic leaders of Los Angeles visited Las Vegas yesterday on a tour to the Hoover dam site conducted by representatives of the Los Angeles department of water and power, bureau of power and light, and led by Dr. E. F. Scattergood, chief electrical engineer and general manager of the bureau. Arriving in this city early yesterday afternoon, the large party stayed here for the night, and plan to spend today at the dam project. According to officials conducting the tour, the members of the visiting party are here as part of an educational program designed by the bureau to outline the details of the huge project, and the progress that has been made up to the time of the present visit.

The visitors, all prominent in the civic affairs of Los Angeles, Hollywood and Beverly Hills, are Dr. Chas. F. Nelson, eminent surgeon; Dr. A. M. Wilkenson, medical specialist; the Rev. Mrs. Kibler returned from Los Angeles Sunday evening, where she has been for the last few days on a business and pleasure trip.

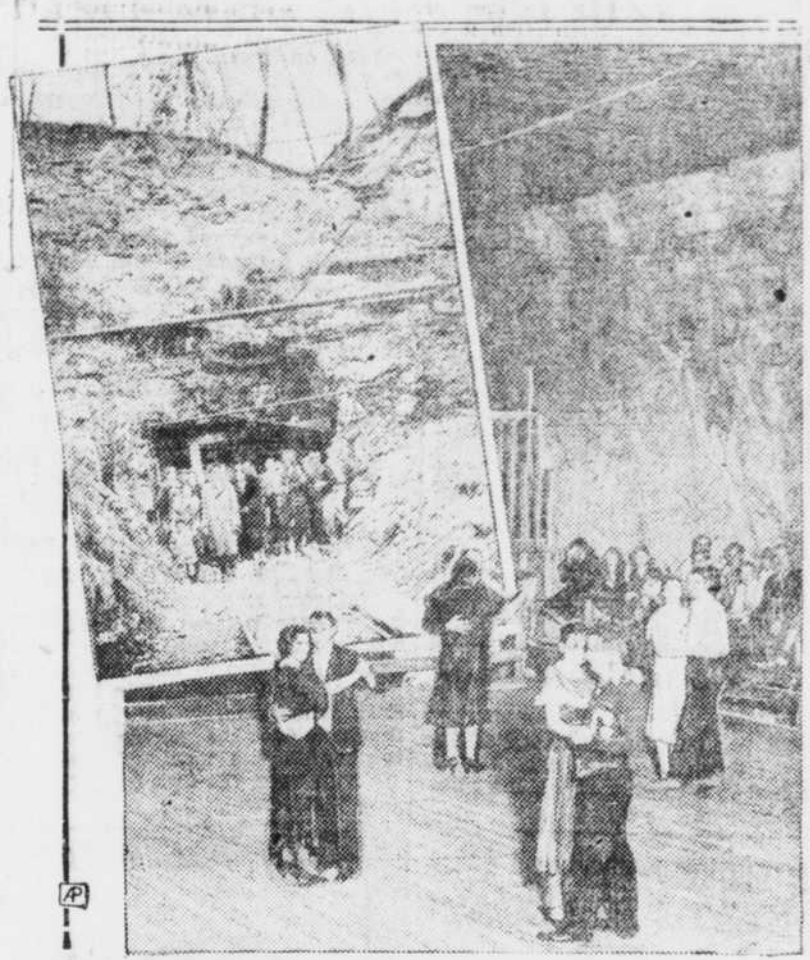
