

HACK WILSON'S 1930 HITTING STYLE RETURNS; GETS HOMERS

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—That truckhorse outfielder of the Brooklyn Dodgers, Robert Lewis Wilson, seems to be regaining the hitting form which made him the home run monarch of the major leagues in 1930.

He suffered an injury to his leg at Boston and was out of the game for 18 days. Since his leg has improved, Hack has been doing well. He has played in 35 games, scored 22 runs and made 40 hits, including 10 homers, seven doubles and two triples, bringing his average up to about .303.

The rotund Hack drove out two home runs today, bringing his total for the season to 10, just three less than he made all last season. Despite Hack's two homers and two other Brooklyn circuit drives, the Dodgers were crushed today by the Philadelphia Phillies, 15 to 7. The Phillies staged a terrific batting attack, pounding Joe Shaute, Babe Phelps and Freddy Heimach for 21 hits, including a home run by Chuck Klein. Three four-run rallies boosted their score.

Despite their beatings in the last couple of days, the entire Brooklyn team has improved considerably in the past three weeks and seems to be clicking at last. The boys are hitting better, and the pitching has increased in effectiveness. Manager Max Carey finally has evolved a combination of four hurlers whom he can rotate with fair success: Dazzy Vance, Van Mungo, Bill Clark and Ray Phelps.

The Dodgers still are weak at first base. Dave Driscoll, business manager, believes Brooklyn has a good chance for the pennant if the Dodgers can lasso a top-notch first-sacker somewhere.

Their regular first baseman, Del Bissonette, is out of the game for the season with a foot injury, and long George Kelly, his substitute, has not been playing up to par. Bruce Caldwell, former Yale grid star, has been signed by Brooklyn

Hack, former stormy petrel of the Chicago Cubs did not make an impressive showing for some time after joining the Dodgers this season.
