ECONOMY BILL

ONGRESS last night passed the omnibus economy bill by which something like one hundred and fifty million dollars will be cut from the cost of the government.

The treasury department recommended that 238 million dollars be cut from governmental expenses, but by eliminating all cuts aimed at the veterans' activities and also by putting into effect President Hoover's plan for enforced furloughs as a substitute for the straight cut of ten per cent in salaries, the proposed reductions are cut from 238 millions to about 150 million.

The bill now goes back to the house and after that to the conference committee for settlement of any remaining differences between the two houses.
