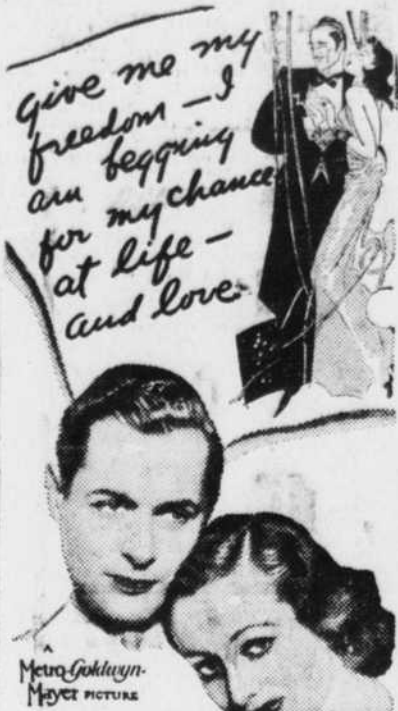

LEGION VISITORS WILL BE TAKEN ON TOUR OF DAM PROJECT FRIDAY

Through the courtesy of Walker R. Young and Frank T. Crowe chief construction engineers for the Bureau of Reclamation, and the Six Companies, Inc., respectively Legionnaires, Legion Auxiliary members and their friends who are attending the convention will be given the opportunity to view the workings of the mighty Hoover dam project from various points of vantage, including a trip through one of the four main diversion tunnels.

Walker R. Young, engineer in charge of construction, has made arrangements for the orderly management of the trip. In his letter of instructions to all concerned, he says: "It is expected that a delegation of approximately 200 Legionnaires will leave Las Vegas June 10th at 11:30 a. m. and assemble at Boulder City Legion hall, where the procession will be lined up for the trip."

"In order that the party may get over the work with as little confusion as possible, it is essential that the direction of the party be in one head and our official guide Claude Williams, is hereby delegated to manage the trip over the work."

Chief of Police Bodell will assist Mr. Williams by assigning officers as requested to keep the party under control. The caravan will proceed to the gravel grading and washing plant. After viewing this gigantic structure, the cars will be escorted farther down the lower river road and on into Black canyon, past the river camp dormitories, around the "Horn," a point in the canyon walls which rise almost perpendicular from the water's edge approximately 1,000 feet.

It was here that the largest single blast, 16 tons of dynamite, was discharged in building the roadway around the point. After rounding the Horn the caravan will pass by the low level mixing plant, one of the largest of its type ever constructed, and on through one of the railroad and truck tunnels and to the entrance of number one diversion tunnel. On entering the tunnel, which is the longest of the four fifty-six foot bore, drivers will be instructed to keep intervals of fifty feet between cars and cautioned not to stop until signaled at the lower portals. Here the caravan will be halted and visitors will be permitted to leave their cars and view the workings.

After leaving the lower portals the cars will be driven to the end of the road leading to Lookout point. Here the visitors will again disembark and walk to the rim of the canyon at the point which commands a fine view of the spillways and the canyon.

HAIL STORM HITS GRAPE CROP
