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MARKETS AT A GLANCE

By OTTO E. STRUM (United Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, June 10, AP—An old-time "squeeze" of the short interest, rising grain prices and a run of favorable business news sent the stock market up 1 to 4 points today.

Thrills of the old "bull" market were revived when Auburn Auto shot up almost 22 points as shorts, frightened by the stock's strength yesterday and early today, scrambled to cover late in the session today.

Nervousness spread to shorts in other issues, notably Case, which was bid up more than 8 points. Meanwhile, buying operations were revived in all sections of the list, gaining momentum when wheat spurted almost 2 cents a bushel.

Traders in the Chicago wheat pit got the best surprise of the season when the government's crop report placed the probable winter wheat crop at 410,600,000 bushels, which would be the smallest yield since 1925, with that exception, since 1917.

General buying and short covering came into grains as a result of the forecast, it having been expected that recent rains had improved the wheat crop. Not only was there no improvement, but the estimate was 30,000,000 bushels less than the May 1 report.

A reduction of 174,764 tons in U. S. Steel's backlog of unfilled orders on May 21, as compared with April 30, was announced today, but had only a passing effect on stocks, which were under the influence of the rise in Auburn.

"Agricultural" stocks, of shares of companies whose earnings are more or less dependent on the farmers' purchasing power, were in brisk demand as the result of the short wheat crop report. Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester and others followed J. I. Case on the bulge.

Steel, American Can, Allied Chemical, General Electric, Du Pont and other industrial leaders closed with gains of fractions to more than three points as a result of the day's operations on the bull side.

A sharp rise in the American dollar, indicating an early halt to the gold flow out of the country that has amounted to \$113,000,000 in a week, helped the rise, as did prospects of the senate adjournment next week for the G. O. P. convention.

Public utility and railroad stocks, recently under the hammer, scored noteworthy comebacks in the day's advance. Consolidated Gas closed at 37 1/2, up 3/4, North American at 18 1/2, up 2, and Public Service at 34, up 2 1/2, to feature the power and light issues.

REASONABLE DOUBT

THAT SIX COMPANIES must have some reasonable doubt as to whether or not they should pay taxes to the State of Nevada and County of Clark is quite evident from the fact that the company deducts the poll tax required by the state, from the first ten day's pay of every employee.

According to reports there have been turned over to the County Assessor. Six Companies holds the money and collects the interest.

What will become of this money if the Company succeeds in its attempt to avoid taxation? It will be practically impossible to return it to the men from whom it was collected. By the termination of the contract Six Companies will have realized a nice little sum by issuing poll tax receipts.

JUNIOR COLLEGE

THE TIME has come when Las Vegas people should seriously advocate the establishment of a Junior college here for the accommodation of southern Nevada high school graduates.

There has been no more worth while movement educationally during the past few years than the growth of the Junior College movement. It has proved its worth equally to the student, the University and the community.

With the greater flexibility of our educational system, high schools are each year graduating hundreds of students of 15 and 16 years of age. These students are mentally able to cope with the work of the courses of study of the higher institutions of learning, but emotionally unfitted for entering upon the regular life of the university, away from home.

Furthermore, of the thousands of students who register as freshmen each fall, a large percentage are lost in the first and second years of college. While the unfinished college course is perhaps better for the student than no advanced education at all, it still has the disadvantage of getting nowhere in particular for the reason that it is incomplete.

The Junior College is designed especially for those students who do not wish a complete college course, or who are unable financially to obtain one. Its two year courses are complete in themselves and are designed to fit the boy or girl whose ambitions are non-professional for a place in the economic world.

Las Vegas High School graduates alone totalled 73 this year. Next year's class will be more than 100. In addition there are high schools in the Moapa and Virgin valleys, and at Panaca, whose graduates could take advantage of a Junior college here.

FALSE STATEMENT

THE STATEMENT by Secretary Wilbur to the Department of the Interior that Six Companies of Boulder City have never called upon governmental agencies of the State of Nevada for service is recognized as false by those in touch with the situation. Secretary Wilbur may be sincere in making the statement, but he is quite patently unfamiliar with conditions here.
