MINERS ENJOY AWAIT RESCUE

PARK CITY, Utah, June 11-U.P)—The comforts of home were enjoyed today by six miners entombed for 30 hours in a tunnel of the Silver King Western mine In the meantime rescue crews dug away steadily at the barrier of soggy earth only to see furth-

er cave-ins erase their progress. There is little danger The six men-William O'Neil, shift boss; Gilbert Carter, Clair Smith, Clark Bennett, George Potter and Mike Ruby-were trapped Friday shortly after they began work.

Rescue crews penetrated the muddy wall with pipes to drain off underground water. Other pipes were driven into supply fresh air. Still more were used as conduits for food and drink.

Inside the tunnel, the men have connected electric heaters and are comfortable. They are patiently awaiting their rescue.
