Distribution which will also be supervised by the Red Cross, will be on a basis of approximately 150 pounds per family of five every 90 days as long as the supply holds out. ## TO LAY CORNERSTONE OF ST. CHRISTOPHER'S CHURCH AT B. C. TODAY

That Boulder City is building for permanency is again being evidenced by the laying of the cornerstone this morning of St. Christopher's church on the corner of Utah and Wyoming streets.

The impressive service, one of the most outstanding events in the church history of the reservation city will begin at 9:30 marking the official dedication of the edifice to the memory and name of St. Christopher.

Christopher, according to biblical history was the Saint who dwelt near a river ford and who, in pursuit of his good work, helped people across the river. One day he carried over his shoulder, a child, who on being set down on the opposite shore, revealed himself as the Christ Child. Great was his joy at learning the honor bestowed on him for this his reward and hence he was named "The Christ Bearer."

The history of St. Christopher church in Boulder City began even before plans for the reservation city were completed, when nearly two years ago, its supporters began meetings with Walker R. Young, chief construction engineer for the bureau of reclamation, regarding a site as soon as the first plans of the city were drawn.

The present site was awarded by the government early this year, and immediately thereafter plans for the church to be built on the rocky hill which covered the site were drawn by Paul Warner, Las Vegas architect.

Truth, stranger than fiction, next took a hand when it was decided to blast the hill and use the rock, at the same time preparing a parking space adjoining the church site.

This being done and the hill removed it was necessary to draft new plans to build the present two story structure.

St. Christopher's Cross was erected on the site on March 6. Ground was first broken for the new church on April 25, and work has gone forward steadily ever since.

An initial appropriation of \$5,000.00 was won from the National Council by Bishop Thomas Jenkins, backed by the Synod of the Pacific, after he had presented the wonderful opportunity for the church in Boulder City to the house of Bishops meeting in Garden City April 28. At this same meeting Bishop Jenkins also secured an appropriation for one year's salary for a full time pastor at Boulder City.

The first church service was held in Boulder City on December 13, 1931 with Bishop Jenkins preach-

ing the first sermon. The first celebration of Holy Communion was held on January 3. The celebrant was the Vicar of Christ Church, Las Vegas. Since then regular services have been held twice a month in one of the school houses on B street.

The first service on the actual site of the church was at the dedication of the huge rustic cross on March 6, when the first Holy baptism also took place.

A church service league was formed and held its first meeting at the home of Mrs. Ben Sucher on March 15, since which time it has been meeting regularly twice a month in the waiting room of the Union Bus terminal. The first church social meeting was held April 13 in honor of Bishop Jenkins who then first announced the appropriation for the new building and new full time priest.

Paul A. Warner of Las Vegas is the architect of the church. Elmer E. Butterworth of Hawthorne is the church contractor in charge and the following are workmen so far engaged in construction: George Rich, Herman Rich, C. C. Cosby, S. A. Metten, John Noggle, Jack Riley, L. J. Watson, Arthur Griffin, H. I. Arch, Chester Himmel, L. R. Huike and G. G. Langley.

Every member and friend of the church is cordially invited to this ceremony this morning.

The Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins will conduct the service.
