After more than an hour's lively discussion, including statements by several past commanders, an amendment was finally incorporated into the by-laws whereby the past department commanders would have every privilege of convention delegates except voting power.

With the convention drawing to a close, resolutions were passed commending, and expressing the department's gratitude to Las Vegas and Boulder City Legion posts for the hospitality extended during the convention, and to Roy Perssons and Adjutant Al Reed, for their conscientious work in preparation for the annual meeting, and in conducting the department's business for the past year.
