VOTERS' LAST CHANCE

A T THE TIME of the formation of the Republican Citizens Committee Against National Prohibition, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler said in an open letter approving the purposes of the organization:

The time to act in this matter is now. The only chance which American public opinion ever has to express itself so as to affect the policies of government is in the early stages of a Presidential electoral campaign.

The force and truth of Dr. Butler's comment was never so apparent as they appear on the eve of a Republican national convention. Hard-driven by public opinion, which demands an honest settlement of the prohibition issue, the timid and the crafty among the party leaders are still hoping to set aside this question until the conventions are over, the candidates nominated, the platforms published. They know that then it will be too late for the people to shape the campaign issues and compel their candidates to meet them.

A few days will determine the sort of Republicanism for which Republicans will be asked to work, vote and contribute. This is the people's last chance to shape the issues of the coming campaign. Registered Republicans throughout the country, who are three to one for repeal, must insist that their party stand squarely for resubmission and repeal of prohibition. Otherwise it will be doomed to a deserved defeat in November.


