Star Sport Scribe Covers Chicago Convention; Gets Bases Mixed With Planks But Has Swell Time In Mixup

EDITOR'S NOTE—Henry McLemore, the New York sports humorist, who knows scores of race horses but no senators; who calls first-basemen and home run kings by their first names but regards congress as something that gets in the way of baseball scores in final decisions; and whose first political assignment was covering the last congressional baseball game in Washington, has been sent to Chicago to write his impressions of the Republican National convention for the United Press.

McLemore probably knows less of what it's all about in Chicago than any other reporter at the convention, and his assignment is to cover the Republicans from that viewpoint. His first dispatch follows:

Appropriation committee reported navy department supply bill of \$318,218,461 which was \$9,134,000 below the amount authorized by the house.

Minority Leader Robinson introduced a resolution authorizing President Hoover to confer with his cabinet on the best means of obtaining additional savings of \$200,000,000 needed essential in balancing the budget.
