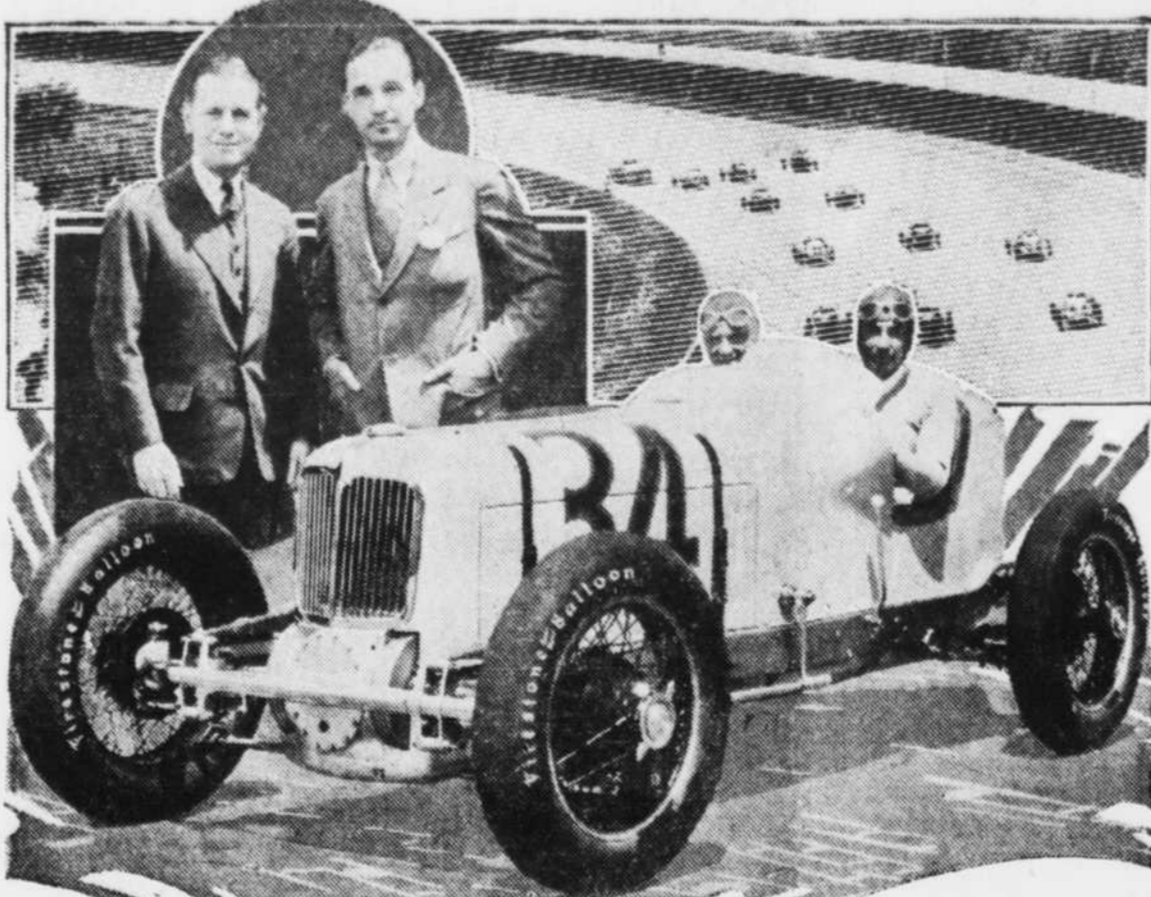
CAR IS STOLEN. OWNER FINDS

WATER RATES HEARING HELD

Three cases were heard by Geo. W. Malone, of the Public Service commission yesterday afternoon in the court house. The first hearing was on the request of the Los Angeles and Salt Lake railroad for permission to close the Islen railroad station situated about fifteen miles east of Caliente. The opposition to the move was in the form of depositions, there being no opponents appearing in person. No decision was rendered. Second matter to occupy the

hearing was the application of F. E. Gottwals, of Boulder City, for permission to operate a taxi service between Boulder City and Las Vegas and other points in Nevada. Opposition to the permit was offered by the Union Pacific stages, and the United Motor Transport company. No decision was handed down. Gottwals is now operating a taxi service in Boulder City. Final hearing was set with reference to the petition some time ago of the South Nevada Land and Development company, to increase their water rates in their local subdivision. At the hearing it developed that water had been furnished for some time by the Las Vegas Land and Water company, and that a suit is now pending in district court for reimbursement for the water used. Since the original petition was filed, the South Nevada Land and Development company has passed out of existence, the physical assets passing to Miller and Buzick of Las Vegas, who refused to appear in favor of the application. Consideration of the above situation caused the dismissal of the application. Yesterday's session concluded the hearings in Las Vegas, and they will be continued Wednesday in Tonopah, where the Tonopah sewer hearing will be held.
