REALTOR SLAIN BY L. A. THUGS

HOLLYWOOD, June 14. (U.P.)—Merton F. Jenks, wealthy Hollywood realty operator and associate of Police Commissioner Thomas Walkup, was shot to death tonight in a battle with a bandit in the Hollywood hills.

The only witness was Mrs. Helen E. Moffitt of Venice, Calif., to whom Jenks was showing some property. She said an armed man leaped from behind the shrubbery and pointed the gun at Jenks, who grappled with him.

"I ran to the car and started to drive away when I heard a shot," she told police.

Mrs. Moffitt was hysterical. Police said they planned to question her husband.

Jenks was found staggering along a nearby boulevard by J. L. Zeller, a passerby.

"The bandits stole my car and my sweetheart," Zeller said Jenks told him. "If I die, tell my wife I loved her."

He died soon after reaching an emergency hospital. Zeller said he mentioned two bandits, but Mrs. Moffitt insisted there was only one.

ECONOMY PLEA DODGED AGAIN WASHINGTON, June 14. (U.P.)—The senate sidestepped the difficult task of obtaining \$150,000,000 in new economies today and then removed obstacles to a compromise agreement on a huge unemployment relief program.

Without even a protest from stalwart administration leaders, the resolution by Minority Leader Joseph T. M. Robinson, of Arkansas, instructing President Hoover to meet with his cabinet and recommend means of obtaining the new additional savings he considers essential to balance the budget, was adopted today.

Democratic leaders of both houses have labeled Mr. Hoover's request for more economy as "politics." Senator Samuel G. Bratton, Dem., N. M., a member of the special economy committee, said the pending appropriation bills could not be reduced \$150,000,000.
