

G. O. P. GOES SOLIDLY FOR OLD GLORY; LINCOLN REGIME ALSO UPHELD, SAYS SPORT SCRIBE

CONVENTION STADIUM, Chicago, June 14. (U.P.)—Scorning the temptation to straddle or side-step the issue, the Republican convention today came out flat footedly and unequivocally for the American flag and Abraham Lincoln.

The Grand Old Party's decision to wholeheartedly support Old Glory against all comers and go on record as endorsing Abraham Lincoln's administration, came with dramatic and breath-taking suddenness and precipitated a demonstration which, old timers insisted, has not been equalled since James A. Garfield took his historic stand against mixing fish and milk.

As if to confound those critics who roast them for their indecisiveness, the Republicans wasted little time in telling the world how they stood today. The convention was not 15 minutes old, and the Porfirio Rican delegation was still out in the lobby downing orange juice, when Senator Simon D. Fess of Ohio, in whose hands the party had placed the responsibility of announcing the stand on Old Glory, broke the news.

ORANGEBURG, N. Y., June 14. (U.P.)—Jack Sharkey hit the fastest clip of his title-bout training today in two stizzling rounds with Joe Sekyra, heavyweight from Dayton, O.

The bulky challenger stepped around with the speed of a lightweight and administered a severe beating to the hard-hitting Sekyra. They went at it hammer-and-tones with the Ohio boxer trying to level Sharkey after being angered by a series of smashing left jabs to the face in the first round.

Sharkey displayed uncanny accuracy and recovery as he rolled with the blows and countered with stiff lefts to the head and hard right smashes to the body.

BETTING SLOW ON HEAVY GO

NEW YORK, June 14. (U.P.)—Max Schmeling is a 10-to-9 favorite to retain his title against Jack Sharkey next Tuesday night in the lightest betting preceding any heavyweight championship bout in 40 years.

Jack Doyle, Broadway betting commissioner, announced the official odds today, quoting 3 to 2 against a knockout in the 15 rounds, and 3 to 1 against Schmeling knocking out Sharkey and 3 to 1 against Sharkey knocking out Schmeling.

"I expect the 10-to-9 odds to carry the men into the ring," said the veteran commissioner. "Of course, heavy money on either man might change the odds. But I think the professional gamblers will come in with their bets fairly evenly balanced about 48 hours before the bout."

The bespectacled, gray-haired Irishman deplored the lack of activity among the betting men preceding what he called "one of the greatest natural gambling fights ever staged." In 40 years of handling fight bets, he claimed there never had been such scarcity of money.

color, in addition to the misspelled "Las Vegas." They said that P. M. Zeller's signature on the forgeries was well high perfect.

Police are working on the theory that the checks were sold to Morris by a ring dealing in spurious pay checks, and are searching for a suspected confederate. They also say that the checks are the work of experienced forgers and will be found to be in wider circulation than locally.

Morris claims that he found the checks, and though admitting nothing, claims to know nothing of their origin.

Police are still searching for the California address of Mrs. Violet Derrick, who is alleged to have passed several bad checks before leaving town.

According to current report, she cashed personal checks amounting to \$100 at the Colonial Dress Shop, \$65 at Lasky's shoe store, \$65 at the Hollywood Style shop, \$50 at Ronzone's, \$65 at the Boulder Drug store, and \$65 at the Metro store. The Boulder Drug and Ronzone's were able to get their money back before the woman left, but the others are still contemplating action against her.

SUIT FILED IN MORTGAGE CASE

Echoing recent marital difficulties, Edith Mary McLaughlin, divorced wife of William J. Hooper, is defendant in a suit filed yesterday by A. A. Hinman, representing H. M. Strohecker, demanding the foreclosure of a mortgage on real estate formerly owned jointly by Hooper and his wife, and later given her as a property settlement after their divorce. Hooper was formerly U. S. commissioner in Las Vegas.

According to the complaint, the mortgage was given while they were still man and wife, to secure a \$2,000 note signed jointly by them. Since that time, the complaint alleges, no payment has been made except a portion of the interest, and suit is brought for the face value of the note plus the balance of the interest and \$500 attorney's fees.

The complaint also names the Pioneer Title and Trust Co., the Mutual Building and Loan association, and a series of John Does, Richard Does, etc., as co-defendants.
