ELKS PRESENT FLAG PROGRAM

More than four hundred Las Vegas were present at the impressive Elks' flag day exercises on the court house lawn yesterday evening.

Judge William E. Orr presided at the ceremonies, and introduced A. W. Ham, who gave the story of the evolution of the American flag.

Ham started with the original regimental and regional flags carried by the various factions, united for the first time in the fight for American independence, and continued on through the development of battle standards of the colonists, until the first Betsy Ross flag of thirteen stripes and thirteen five-pointed stars was unfurled over the heads of Colonial troops.

From this time, as the story was unfolded by the Vegas attendees, the flag developed into its present beautiful design, as each state was added to the union, and the flag became a symbol of liberty throughout the world, advanced to the farthest corners of the earth through United States military prowess and economic advancement.

Jack Price, official organist for the lodge, provided the music for the rites, and Dan Ferguson sang several songs in the open air ceremonies.

GROUP LABORS ON PLANKS FAR INTO NIGHT

Continued from page one of the whole problem, including the "technological" employment phase. The debenture farm relief plan was among plank suggestions for agricultural aid made by Lewis J. Taber, head of the national grange.

FLAYS EXTRAVAGANCE Representative John Q. Tilson, Republican, Connecticut, urged a strong plank condemning extravagance in government on behalf of "the forgotten man—the taxpayer."

A plank endorsing completion of all authorized federal waterway improvements was proposed by Representative Frank Reed, Illinois, representing the national rivers and harbors congress now in session here.

United States entry into the League of Nations was urged by Charles H. Strong, of the League of Nations association, who said he was "not particularly proud" of the league's action in the Japanese-Chinese crisis, but said this would have been more effective had the United States been a member.

Governor Dan Turner of Iowa brought rounds of cheers when he demanded that the Republican party stop "twiddling its thumbs about booze and do something about relief for the unemployed, business and the farmer."

"I implore you to get busy on something else besides this booze question," he shouted belligerently. "We've got eight or nine million people out of work. The Republican party has the greatest opportunity since its founding, and yet you twiddle your thumbs about booze."

CREDIT CONTROL URGED The Iowa governor advocated clothing the federal reserve board with power to control credit in order to restore the commodity price level to its pre-depression basis.

Prefacing his remarks with the smiling admission that she was showing "bravery," Miss Jane Adams, of Hull house, recommended that the Republican party go on record for a reduction of tariffs, for cancellation of war debts and recognition of Russia.

"We don't care about the form of government in Russia," she said, "but recognition would help trade. It would bring her back into the family of nations and lessen the danger of war."

Fred B. Smith, representing 30 peace organizations, urged declarations in favor of the World court, co-operation with the League of Nations for the reduction of armaments and insertion of "teeth" into the Kellogg pact to penalize signatory nations which violated it.

GRABS ROBBER'S GUN; IS KNIFED

Francisco Villa (not to be confused with the infamous Pancho) has a nice, new 410 shotgun today. He wrested it from a would-be hold-up man who thrust it through the front door of Villa's Westside cabin and demanded Villa's money or his life.

Villa grabbed at the gun barrel, and the two men scuffled. The stranger wielded a knife, slashed Villa on the hand and shoulder, but escaped. Villa, who was not seriously hurt, had the gun but could give police no description of his assailant.

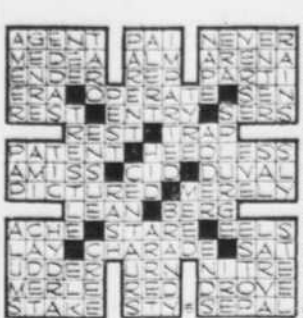

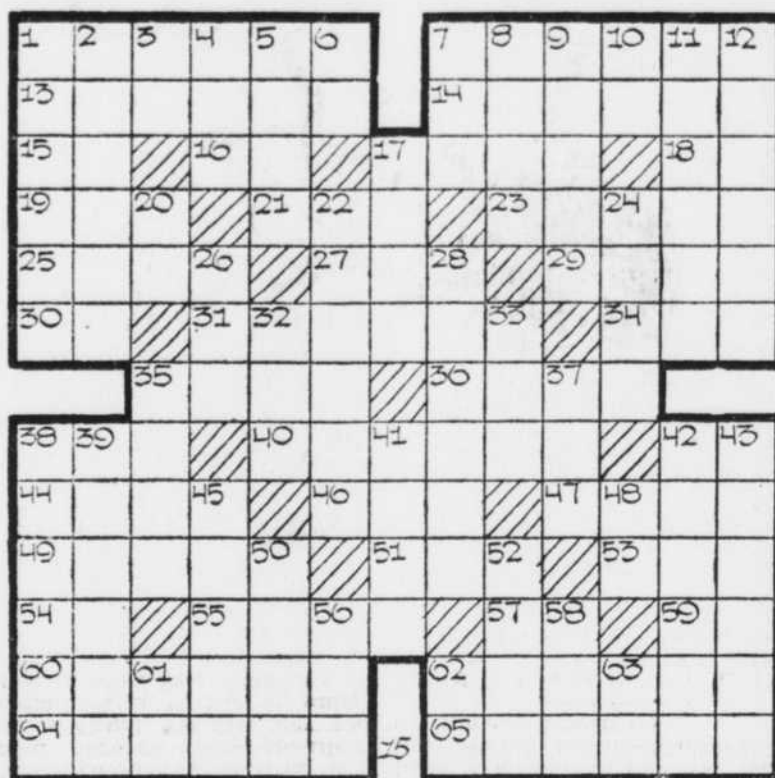

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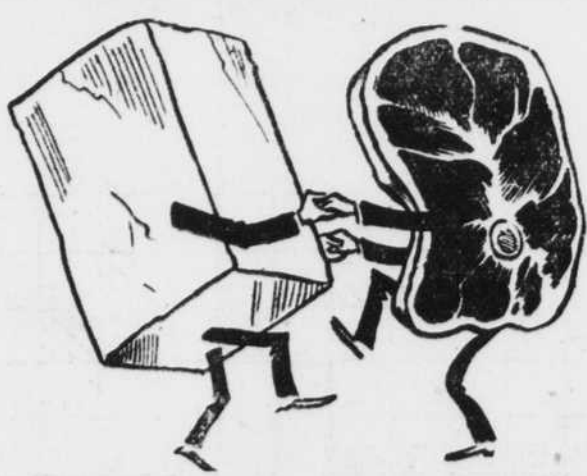
BARRYMORE JR MA CHAN SHAN PERFECT ALIBI IS FUGITIVE

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BOMBERS MAY BE SENT HERE

Las Vegas and Boulder City reserve officers are planning to invite several army bombing planes here from March field in the near future for observation training for the local officers, it was learned last night.

Plans are now under way for making the necessary arrangements, according to a letter to the local officers, reading in part: "If you are interested in having two bombers fly to Las Vegas for an overnight stay for the purpose of giving observation training to your officers, it can probably be arranged at an early date."

"Such a trip would be voluntary on the part of the pilots and crews, but if your offer to pay the expenses of the six officers and men still stands, I believe volunteers would be forthcoming, for the reputation of Las Vegas for its hospitality is well known here."
