Although the galleries at the convention attempted to swing delegates toward an absolute repeal plank in the prohibition stand of the party, and despite fiery debate, the convention swung in line and rejected the platform committee's minority report on repeal, thus automatically adopting the resubmission plank, which, as wise leaders in the party know, definitely expresses the attitude of the administration.

These items, with some twenty-odd other planks, form the platform of the Republicans.

All in all, it is a comprehensive, forceful and sane program. Every thinking American will agree.
