Automatic dial phones will be used exclusively by the Southern Nevada Telephone company.

The next meeting will be with Mrs. S. L. Carter, 1205 New Mexico, on Wednesday, the twenty-ninth of June.

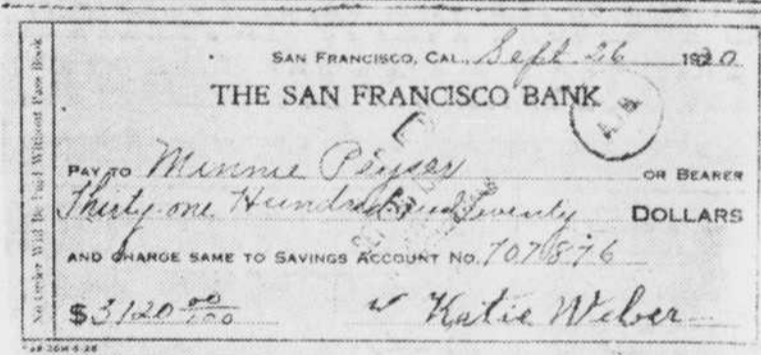
GIVES PARTY IN HONOR OF DAUGHTER
