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## NEGLECTED CHILDREN

**THE WHITE HOUSE** conference on child health and protection quietly continues its work, publishing reports now and then which ought to receive thoughtful study. One such report, recently brought out, declares there has been widespread failure to deal adequately with the 200,000 delinquent children in America. From improper treatment of these cases, or outright neglect, comes much of the adult crime which now plagues America. In the words of the report:

"Much of our present mode of handling these problems is but the endless monotonous task of sweeping up the debris of life."

There should be more wise effort to prevent wreckage and debris. The report criticizes the treatment of truancy and behavior problems in the schools, the unnecessary arrests of children who are in trouble, the detention of minors in police stations and jails, juvenile courts presided over by judges not prepared for this special work, the lack of any psychiatric services and facilities for good institutional care, the lack of an effective parole system, and the common indifference toward a community program which might develop wholesome interests.

These charges apply to us all. It is the apathetic or ignorant attitude of citizens generally which makes it possible for dangerous errors in treatment of children to continue year after year.

## AUCTIONED JOBS

**THERE** is economy. There is also stinginess which is waste in the long run. The mayor of a Minnesota town has mistaken the latter for the former. He has heard that it is time to cut salaries and reduce public expense generally, but he has little idea of the rational way to go about it.

He announced that the existing municipal wage scale was to be discontinued and that all public jobs would then go to the lowest bidders. According to the story, policemen who had been paid \$135 a month were replaced by men willing to work for a good deal less. Every worker in any department who was under-bid in the job auction was fired and replaced by the cheapest applicant.

One wonders how far this went and what sort of employes the town now has. Such a system of hiring would soon wreck any government, since it would permit the employment of untrained, unskilled, ignorant perhaps dishonest individuals. In the end this salary economy may prove very expensive. It might be just as well for that town if some one would under-bid the mayor himself.

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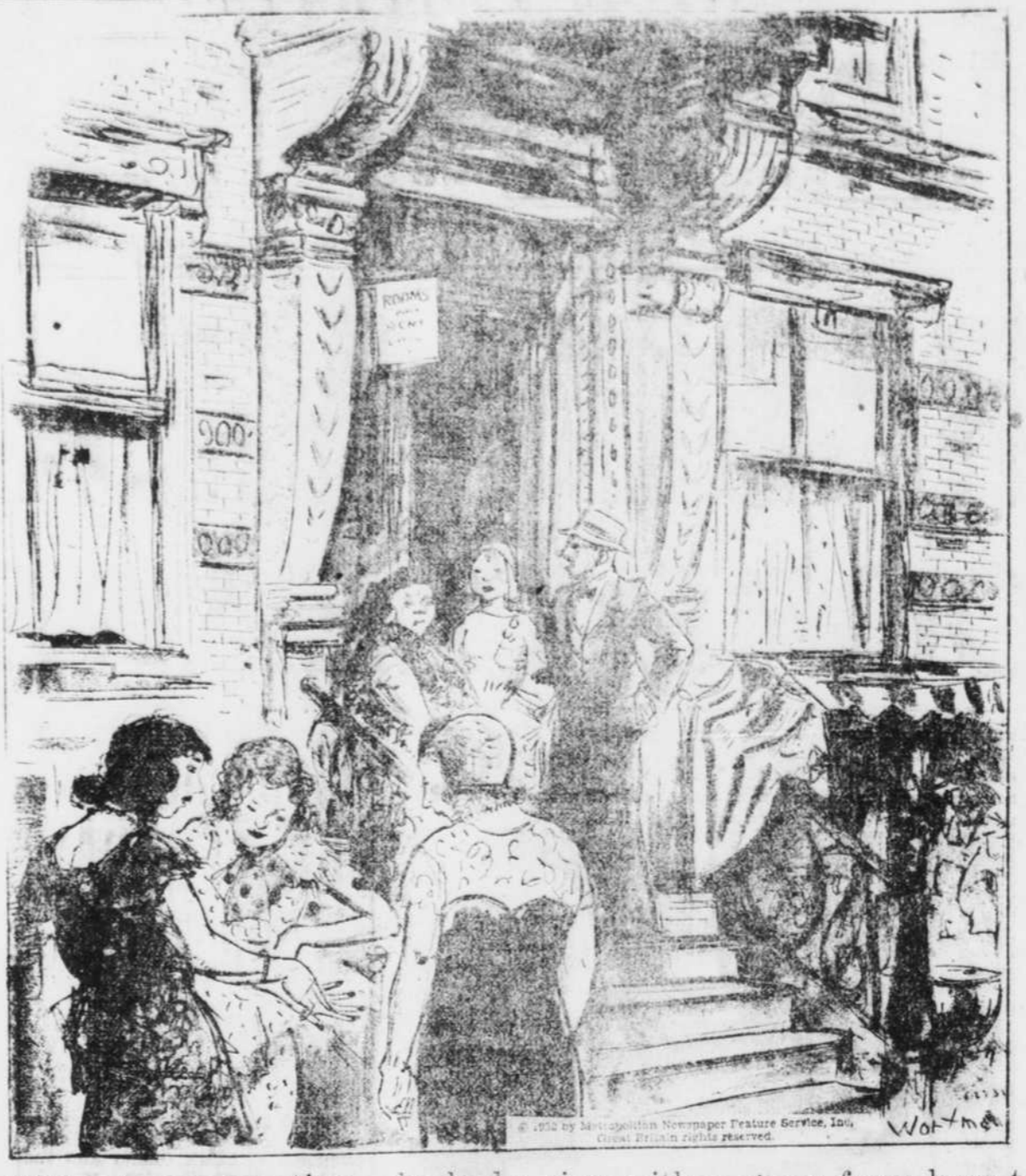
