## Issuance Of Passes To Tourists Will Be Made At Reserve Gates; Increase In Visitors Expected

More than 10,000 tourists and local sightseers have passed through the reservation gate, each of the past three months according to statistics compiled by the police department.

The number of tourists visiting the Hoover dam project will in all probability be greatly increased reservation officials believe when it is more generally known that all they need to do to enter the reservation is to apply at the gate and a visitors pass will be issued to them without inconvenience or loss of time.

Anyone wishing to visit with relatives or friends living in Boulder City may do so by applying for a pass at the gate. When receiving their pass they will be instructed to take it to the police station where permission will be granted in writing, specifying the length of time the visitor requests to stay in the reservation city. On leaving the reservation all visitors are requested to turn in their passes at the gate.


