DRESIDENT Hoover extended his leadership to the nations of the world by his demand yesterday that the expenditures of all nations for military purposes be reduced one-third.

The proposal, coming with dramatic suddenness, has already received the informal approval of the rulers of several nations and the entire world is feeling revived hope in the prospect of a substantial reduction in armament costs.

The President's proposal has put into definite, concrete form a new idea of armament reductions and gives new impetus to the movement which he has been advancing toward world peace.

It is one of the things which, if adopted by the principal powers, will hasten the return of prosperity to the hearths of the humble people of the world, as nothing else can do.
