

Cards Still Sliding As Giants Get Another Game In National; Detroit Tigers Strengthen 2nd Place Hold

NEW YORK, June 23. (AP)—The New York Giants rose from seventh to fifth place in the National league today by virtue of their 6-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

A three-run rally in the third inning put the game on ice for the Giants. Jim Bottomley's home run was the only tally the Cards could manufacture off Fred Fitzsimmons. The Terrymen pounded Derringer, Lindsey and Carleton for 12 hits including home runs by Jackson and Vergez.

This defeat dropped the Cards to seventh place, while the Brooklyn Dodgers dropped to sixth position because of their 8-7 loss to the Boston Braves.

A triple by Al Spohrer in the tenth inning scored Clark from first base, and gave the Braves victory. Dazzy Vance, A. Moore and Shaute yielded 15 hits to the Braves, while Siebold, Cantwell and Betts were found for 16. Taylor drove out a homer for Brooklyn in the first inning.

The Philadelphia Phillies downed the Chicago Cubs 16 to 10 in a free hitting game. The Phillies made 16 hits off four Cub pitchers while Phil Collins gave Chicago 14. Chuck Klein of Philadelphia hit his twenty-first homer in the fifth inning with bases loaded.

They were the only games scheduled in the National league.

Goose Goslin, leftfielder of the St. Louis Browns, drove out three home runs, accounting for seven tallies as the Browns downed the New York Yankees 14-10. Babe Ruth drove out his twenty-second homer of the season, and Lou Gehrig his eighteenth.

The Browns pounded Piperas, Allen, Wells and Ruffing for 16 hits, while the Yanks found Hadley, Blaholder, Herbert and Gray for 12.

Detroit's Tigers registered their sixth straight victory by downing the staggering Boston Red Sox, 6 to 3. This victory strengthened Detroit's hold on second place in the American league.

Tom Bridges, hurling for the Tigers, was injured by a line drive and probably will be out of the game for two weeks. Bridges and Hogsett yielded ten hits to Boston, the same number allowed by Weiland and Andrews.

OLIN DUTRA IN U. S. OPEN LEAD

FLUSHING, N. Y., June 23. (AP)—Olin Dutra, junior member of the California golfing firm of Dutra and Dutra, slipped quietly around Fresh Meadow's wind-swept course today to become the big name of the first day's play in the U. S. open championship.

This gay caballero from Brentwood, Calif., uncorked one of those occasional super-rounds, and turned in a card of 69, one stroke below Fresh Meadow's all-but-impossible par.

He was the only one of the field of 144 starters to break par.

Mac Smith scored an 89. George Van Elm had a 79. Tammy Armitt's score was 82, and Gene Sarazen, tournament favorite, had a 74.

These were the big four when the tournament started, and Sarazen alone escaped taking part in the greatest blup in the history of the national tourney.

The breezes that sometimes make the always difficult Fresh Meadow course a severe test of golfing skill, howled from out of the west, blew drives into the rough, sent approaches into traps, and faded putts all the time.

Leo Diegel, rocker-armed putter from Agua Caliente, carded a 73 to hold second honors, and Jose Jurado, popular Argentine who is the only "foreign menace" in the tournament, tied with Sarazen for third honors at 74.

Billy Burke, defending champion, Walter Hagen, Detroit, and Lloyd Gullickson of Cleveland, were next in line with 75's.

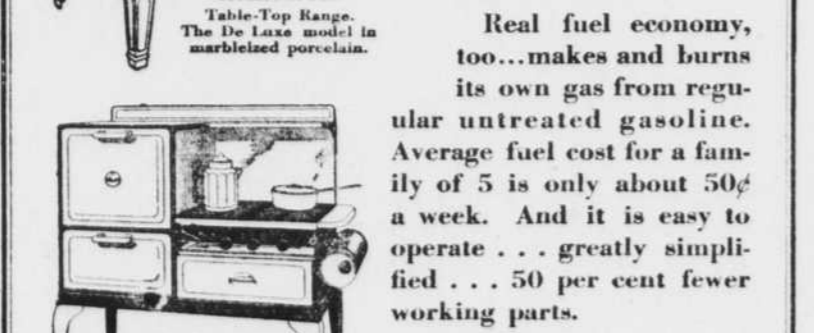
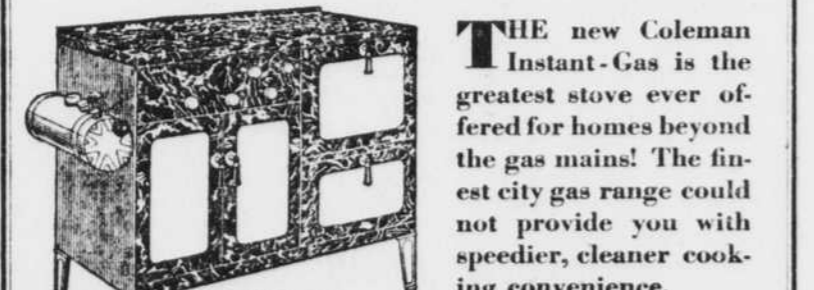
