BOULDER THEATRE NOW EQUIPPED WITH CARRIER AIR-CONDITIONER

The Boulder theatre today announces the addition of manufactured weather.

Upon completion of the installation of the world famous Carrier system, they now offer their patrons not only the last word in comfort, but healthful conditioned air as well.

Through long research it has been found that a temperature of approximately 70 degrees Fahrenheit, with a relative humidity of from 35 to 40 per cent is most practical and comfortable. The air should be cleaned and washed or filtered to protect the health of patrons and to preserve the beauty of the decorations and draperies, engineers claim. A proper quantity of conditioned air should be carried throughout every part of the building without drafts, they say.

Correct air conditioning producing these results can be obtained only from a correct installation of equipment which has been designed and installed to meet the individual needs of each theatre.

Neither time nor cost have been spared in obtaining these results, according to the theatre management.

The Carrier system provides for more than cooling of air. The refrigerator used in connection is designed to produce a complete air conditioning unit which includes a large fan, spray and cooling chamber, automatic dampers, heaters and sound silencers all in one compact machine especially designed for the theatre.

In view of the tremendously high cost of the Carrier Refrigerating system, few theatres throughout the United States have installed them. However, records show that in those so equipped, attendance during the summer as well as the cooler months shows a large increase.

It was stated by the theatre management last evening that attendance is rapidly increasing and it is felt that the theatre will prove to be a very popular place for the matinees as well as the evening shows during the coming months.

Since the change to Western Electric sound equipment has been made, the theatre has been pointed out by engineers from the coast as having what is considered one of the finest sound reproduction equipments in the state.

HASKELL MAN IN DECATHLON

BYCHE STADIUM, EVANSTON, Ill., June 24. (U.P.)—Wilson Charles, Jr., three-eighths Indian from Haskell institute, established a lead of more than 200 points over his nearest rival in the first five events in the final Olympic decathlon tryouts here today. Charles, a descendant of the Onondaga tribe, scored 4,030, 23,625 points out of a possible 5,000.

The remaining five events, the 110-metre hurdles, discus throw, pole vault, javelin throw, and 1,500 metres run, will be held tomorrow morning. The three leaders at the end of the ten events will represent the United States in the decathlon at the Olympic games, Los Angeles, in August.
