Recovering the rest of the electric
clocks stolen June 20 when the Ne-
vada electric shop was burglarized,
city police yesterday arrested J.
Walter Twyman at the Montana
hotel, after watching his abode all
night.

Twyman was arrested at about
11 o'clock yesterday morning, when
he returned to his room. He gave
his former residence as Bismarck,
Neb. He was formally charg-
ed with grand theft, since the value
of the clocks stolen was well over
\$100. Police said he admitted the
theft, and disclaimed having had
any assistance in the burglary.

The first part of the loot was
recovered Thursday night by Sheriff
Keate and Chief of Police Williams.
All of the clocks were returned to
the Nevada Electric shop yester-
day.

MARKETS AT A GLANCE

NEW YORK, June 24. (U.P.)--Un-
settled by fears of "pork barrel" leg-
islation in congress and by the epide-
miology of bank closings in the mid-
dle west, the stock market slumped
1 to 4 points today, many issues
breaking into new low ground for
the bear market.

Wall street witnessed the spectacle
of Steel company selling at 23 1/2
and American telephone at 77 7/8 as
Americans piled up that congress
would pass a relief bill requiring
a huge government loan. Other
erstwhile "blue chips" that were
hammered down to new lows were
American Can and Allied Chemi-
cal.

Stocks in which middle western
interests are active came in for some
rough handling when three more
Chicago banks closed their doors,
bringing the total for the past
month to 34. Sears Roebuck, Mont-
gomery Ward, J. I. Case, Union Pa-
cific and Atchafalpa were severely
affected.

Reduction of the New York fed-
eral reserve bank's discount rate from
3 to 2 1/2 per cent caused only a
temporary halt at the opening,
the slump beginning as soon as the
Washington and Chicago news came
trickling into the financial district.

Chicago selling was blamed for a
crash of nearly 10 points in Auburn
Auto, which touched a low of 45 and
closed at 45 3/4 for a loss of 9 1/4
points. Other motors moved in a
narrow groove. General Motors
closed at 8 1/4, off 1/2.

Aside from the acute weakness in
Santa Fe and Union Pacific, both
closing more than 3 points lower,
rails collectively were only fractions
lower at the close, but public utility
stocks absorbed a fair share of
the punishment. Consolidated Gas
closing at 35 1/8, off 2 1/8, North
American at 17, off 1; and Public
Service at 33, off 1 3/4.

Westinghouse Electric, Dupont,
Coca Cola, Continental Can and
other well known stocks showed
losses of 2 to 3 points when the final
gong rang. Unlike other recent
sessions, there was a real desire to
sell stocks and the flow of offerings
was uninterrupted to the close.

The bond market, which, in nor-
mal times, would buck up buoyantly
on the reserve bank's action, had a
temporary flurry on the upside at
the opening, but soon joined stocks
on the slide, rails being sold most
extensively.
