



RISKO VICTOR IN WALKER BATTLE

MUNICIPAL STADIUM, CLEVELAND, O., June 24. (AP)—A bull-rushing, hard-punching Johnny Risko, Cleveland's baker boy, side-tracked the heavyweight championship aspirations of Mickey Walker by slamming his way to a 12-round victory over the "toy bulldog" here tonight.

While 20,000 fans roared their approval, Risko, the old trial horse, staged a sensational comeback. He slugged, punched and rushed his way to a clear cut victory over the former ruler of the welter and middleweights, and the man who held the new heavyweight champion, Jack Sharkey, to a draw.

It was Risko all the way. Walker, appearing tired, fat and flabby, was unable to combat the slam-bang attack of Risko. Only in the tenth and eleventh rounds did the Mickey display the class that made him a champion. Flashing a left hook and right cross, he peppered Risko's midriff and had the Cleveland boy staggering.

But Risko came back in the final round to clinch the decision—an unanimous one. Rushing from his corner, he drove Walker to the ropes with rights and lefts to the head and body. The hardest punch of the fight was landed by Risko in this final stanza, an overhead punch to the side of the face that sent Walker whirling.

The United Press score card gave Risko six rounds, Walker four and two even.

POREDA WINS 'POISON' SMITH TO BATTLE OVER ERNIE SCHAAF GEORGIE GRAY IN LEGION'S NEXT BIG FIGHTING EXHIBIT

WEST NEW YORK, N. J., June 24. (AP)—Stanley Poreda, Jersey City heavyweight, scored a sensational upset tonight by winning a 10-round decision over Ernie Schaaf, highly touted Boston boxer, before 12,000 fans at the stadium.

Schaaf, a protege of champion Jack Sharkey and regarded as the third ranking heavyweight, was completely outclassed by Poreda.

Schaaf won only one round; Poreda took five and four were even.

Poreda gave a mastery exhibition of boxing, completely bewildering the blond Bostonian. He kept Schaaf off balance most of the time with jabbing left jabs to the face and chin.

In the third round, Poreda followed a left jab with a hard right to the head that set Ernie back on his heels, and raised a goose-egg on his forehead.

Schaaf was sadly inaccurate in his timing; he was continually beaten to the punch with left jabs, and his only worthwhile blows were a few right hooks to the body.

Poreda weighed 201 pounds, Schaaf 208.

Gray has been growing heavier right along, and is stepping up one weight class when he meets the big colored boy. The way the two boys have been working it looks to the regular observers as if both fighters plan to make it short and sweet, and both fighters predict that their bout will end in a kayo.

The second edition of the main event will feature two welters who have been drawing cards in all their previous fights, and meet Friday.

JURADO, PERKINS LEAD U. S. OPEN

FRESH MEADOW COUNTRY CLUB, FLUSHING, N. Y., June 24. (AP)—T. Phillip Perkins carded a brilliant 69, and Jose Jurado brought home a 71 to lead in the race for the United States open golf championship in today's play which saw Olin Dutra, giant Californian, unable to stand the prosperity of his first round leadership.

Perkins and Jurado shared honors today with aggregates of 145. Dutra took a 77, which with his 69 of yesterday gave him an aggregate of 146.

Perkins, who used to be British amateur champion, equalled the 69 scored by Dutra in the first round.

Jurado, Argentine champion, was the more consistent, for he followed an opening round total of 74 with a 71, one over par in the second round test.

HARVARD CREW BEATS ELIMEN

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 24. (AP)—Harvard's varsity crew scored the big rowing upset of the year today by finishing three lengths ahead of Yale's highly-touted eight in the seventeenth renewal of their annual regatta on the Thames river.

Taking an early lead, the smooth-sailing crimson shell left the Yale crewmen in the wake throughout the four-mile grind, to chalk up the second consecutive victory in two years.

Harvard covered the four miles in 21 minutes and 29 seconds; Yale in 21:42.
