Chairman Charles L. McNary, Rep., of the senate agriculture committee, revealed tonight.

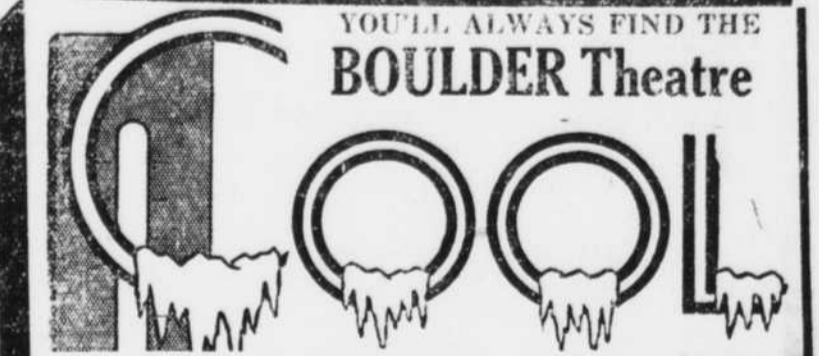
McNary admitted the inquiry was being planned after the senate concluded a sharp debate by refusing to appropriate \$1,000,000 for the board's operation expense.
