

Athletics Nose Senators Out Of Third Place By Winning Double

NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—The Philadelphia Athletics nosed the idle Washington Senators out of third place in the American League today by taking two games from the Boston Red Sox, 15 to 8, and 9 to 4.

George Earnshaw hurled the A's to their first victory, yielding 12 hits while three Boston hurlers allowed 19.

Tony Frietas won the nightcap, allowing but seven hits, while Kline and Jablonowski were found for 11.

Roy Johnson, outfielder for the Red Sox, connected for three home runs during the two games. Cramer and Pickering hit for the circuit in the opener, and Jolley, Simmons and Haas did likewise in the nightcap.

The Detroit Tigers strengthened their hold on second place by downing the Chicago White Sox, 9 to 3. Jazy Goldstein held the Sox to five hits, while the Tigers took advantage of five errors to win with eight hits. Davis and Stone made home runs for Detroit.

St. Louis at Cleveland was washed out. They were the only games scheduled.

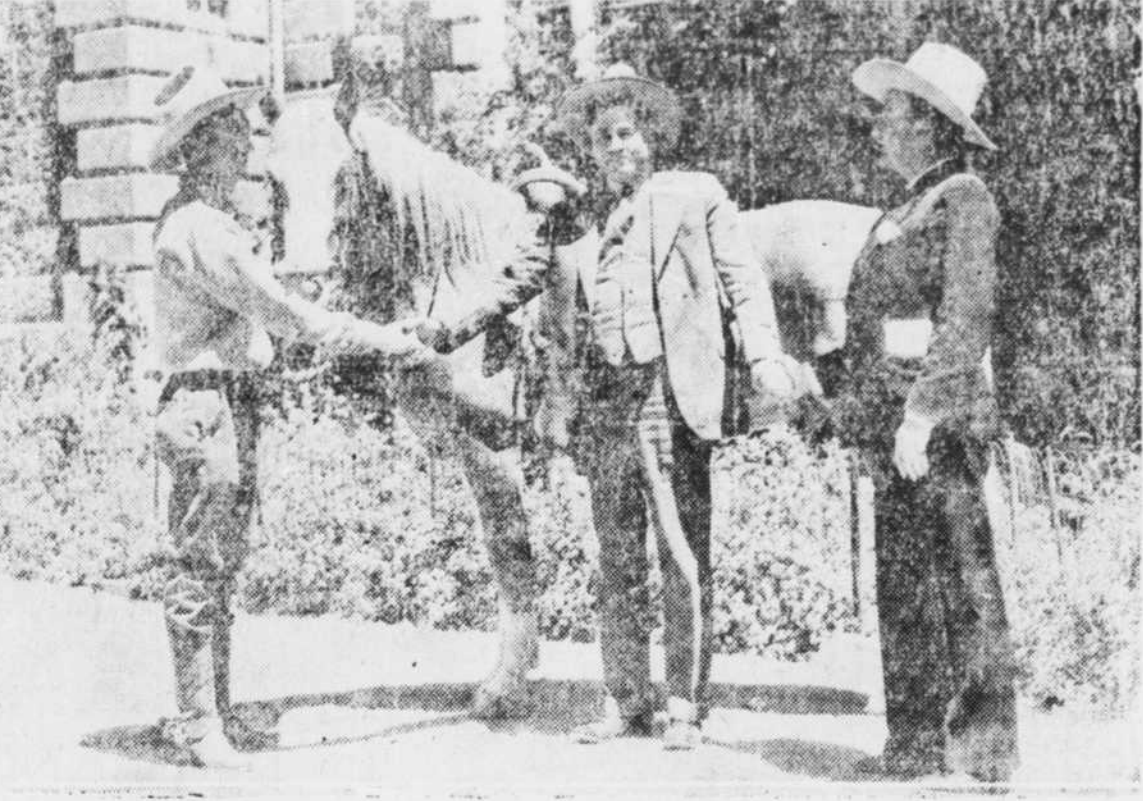

Convention Singer Astounds Body, Knows Second Verse Of National Anthem; John Davis' Bluff Called

CONVENTION STADIUM, CHICAGO, June 27. (AP)—National hat and double cross week, observer once every four years by the Democratic party, was opened today as peace and good will atmosphere of peace and good will as artificial as the flowers on Queen Mary's hat, and as false as a beam's hug.

The nearest approach to a real brawl, however, came when John W. Davis, Democratic nominee for President in 1924 attempted to gain a seat on the speakers' platform.

Confident his fame and name would make up for the lack of a badge, Mister Davis brushed brusquely by the sergeant of arms whose business it is to separate the sheep from the goats. He was about half way up the steps when the guard yelled "halt."

"Where do you think you're going, buddy?" roared the guard.

"I am John W. Davis and I am going on the speakers' platform."

"Never heard of you," replied the guard, taking a firmer grip on

Mister Davis' coat tails. "You just think you're going up there. That's reserved for the big shots. Besides, it doesn't seat but 42 and that ain't hardly room for the candidates. You'd better go up in the balcony."

And Mister Davis probably would have wound up in the peanut stand had not a lot of folks who voted for him in 1924 heard the disturbance and rushed to his aid. The guard finally tumbled and allowed Mister Davis to take a seat next to an eighth of a delegate from Texas.

Mister Davis' troubles passed almost unnoticed, however, for the crowd, at the time was too busy giving Mame Zuluam a thunderous ovation. It was Mame Zuluam, let's call her Smith—who opened national hate and double cross week with a soprano rendition of the Star Spangled Banner. Mrs. Smith has a superb voice (it was obvious that she studied abroad) but it was not her voice which earned her such a rousing demonstration. She brought the house down because of a combination of two other things, namely, her ability to sing the anthem without the words in front of her, and for her knowledge that there was a second verse to the song. A lot of folks didn't know about the second, so far approximately three seconds the customers were treated to the shameful spectacle of the nation's leaders—the nation's backbone, practically—sitting down while the Star Spangled Banner was being sung and played.

Right after this the keynoteer started keynoting. He was a good one, too. Much better than the Republican keynoteer, who every once in a while would raise his voice and wake you up.
