

CARDINALS WIN ANOTHER TILT; YANKEES DEFEAT WASHINGTON

NEW YORK, June 28. (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals replaced Brooklyn in fifth position in the National League standings today by virtue of a 6 to 2 victory over the last-place Cincinnati Reds, while the Dodgers split a double-header with the New York Giants.

Wild Bill Hallahan held the Reds to four hits while his team mates pounded Rixey and Frey for ten safeties. A three-run rally in the fifth inning aided the Cards' score.

The New York Giants won the first game from Brooklyn, 7 to 3, but dropped the nightcap, 3 to 5. Errors by Johnny Frederick and Van Mungo, each permitting two runs to score, gave the Giants victory in the opener. Johnny Frederick homered for the Dodgers, and Lindstrom did likewise for the Giant. In the second game, Johnny Frederick drove out another home run in the eighth with one on and the score tied at 3-all, to give the Dodgers victory. Bill Terry homered for New York.

Boston's Braves climbed to within one percentage point of the second-place Chicago Cubs when young Bobby Brown held the Philadelphia Phillies to four hits, in turning in a 5 to 2 victory. He struck out six batsmen. The veteran "Rabbit" Maranville and Bill Urbanski worked a double steal in the seventh inning, the former coming home.

They were the only games scheduled.

In the American league, the leading New York Yankees were held to four hits but took advantage of seven bases on balls to defeat the Washington Senators, 5 to 2. WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 28. (AP)—Ellsworth Vines of Pasadena was the sole American survivor tonight in the men's singles of the British tennis championships, after a day which saw Sidney B. Wood, defending champion, and Francis X. Shields of New York eliminated in upsets.

Vines, the American singles titleholder and member of the U. S. Davis cup team, entered the semi-final round with Hiro Satou of Japan; Jack Crawford, Australian star, and H. Wilfred "Bunny" Austin of England.

Vines eliminated Enrique Mater of Spain, 6-2, 6-3, 6-2; Satoh defeated Wood, 7-5, 7-5, 2-6, 6-4; Austin eliminated Shields, 6-1, 9-7, 5-7, 6-1, and Crawford downed Fred Perry of England, 6-1, 9-7, 7-5, 6-1, in another sensational upset.
