Fugitive's Alias Beats Noose 18 Years; Recapture Brings Its Shadow Again

He Couldn't Ditch His Past

MOUNDSVILLE, W. Va., June 29. (AP)—Frank Pauletta, under sentence of death for a murder committed 18 years ago, sits in his cell and awaits the next chapter in his tragic life story.

He feels it will be the final one—this despite the reported promise that Gov. W. G. Conley will afford him a measure of relief.

CASE WAS SENSATIONAL

He listened without emotion recently while former court and jail attaches sketched in Clarkburg the crime for which he was convicted, his flight from the noose, his hiding for years under an assumed name and his dramatic capture in a coal mine in western Pennsylvania.

Pauletta quarreled with a fellow miner in a West Virginia mining camp. The other man was killed and Pauletta fled, but was captured as he leaped aboard a freight train.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL

He was convicted and sentenced to be hanged. But a few days before the execution date, the slayer fled the jail and Frank Pauletta disappeared.

Thereafter, Pauletta explains, he "tried to live down" the slaying.

Pauletta described him he and his wife and children fled to the night to Pennsylvania and then located in the little settlement of Coverdale.

KNOWN AS LOUIS ROSS

Pauletta worked in the pits and was respected by his fellow miners who knew him as Louis Ross.

Several months ago, Pauletta was at work in the mine. A stranger approached, called him "Pauletta" and showed a police badge.

The miner was stunned, dropped his pick and fled far back into the dark pit. But the officer captured him and he was hurried to Clarkburg, W. Va., where former officers identified him.

DENIAL BREAKS DOWN

He was firm in his denials until he heard anew the sentence of death.

Then he called Sheriff W. B. Grimm and said simply: "I am Frank Pauletta."



A murder of which Frank Pauletta was convicted 18 years ago in West Virginia has led to his recapture despite his alias of Louis Ross, adopted after he escaped following his trial. Returned to jail by an officer who captured him at work in a distant mine, he now awaits his fate, possibly execution, although softening of the sentence is possible.

Leslie "Duck" Barger and Gilbert "Lightning" Chandler are leaving Thursday morning for a short visit to Kansas City.

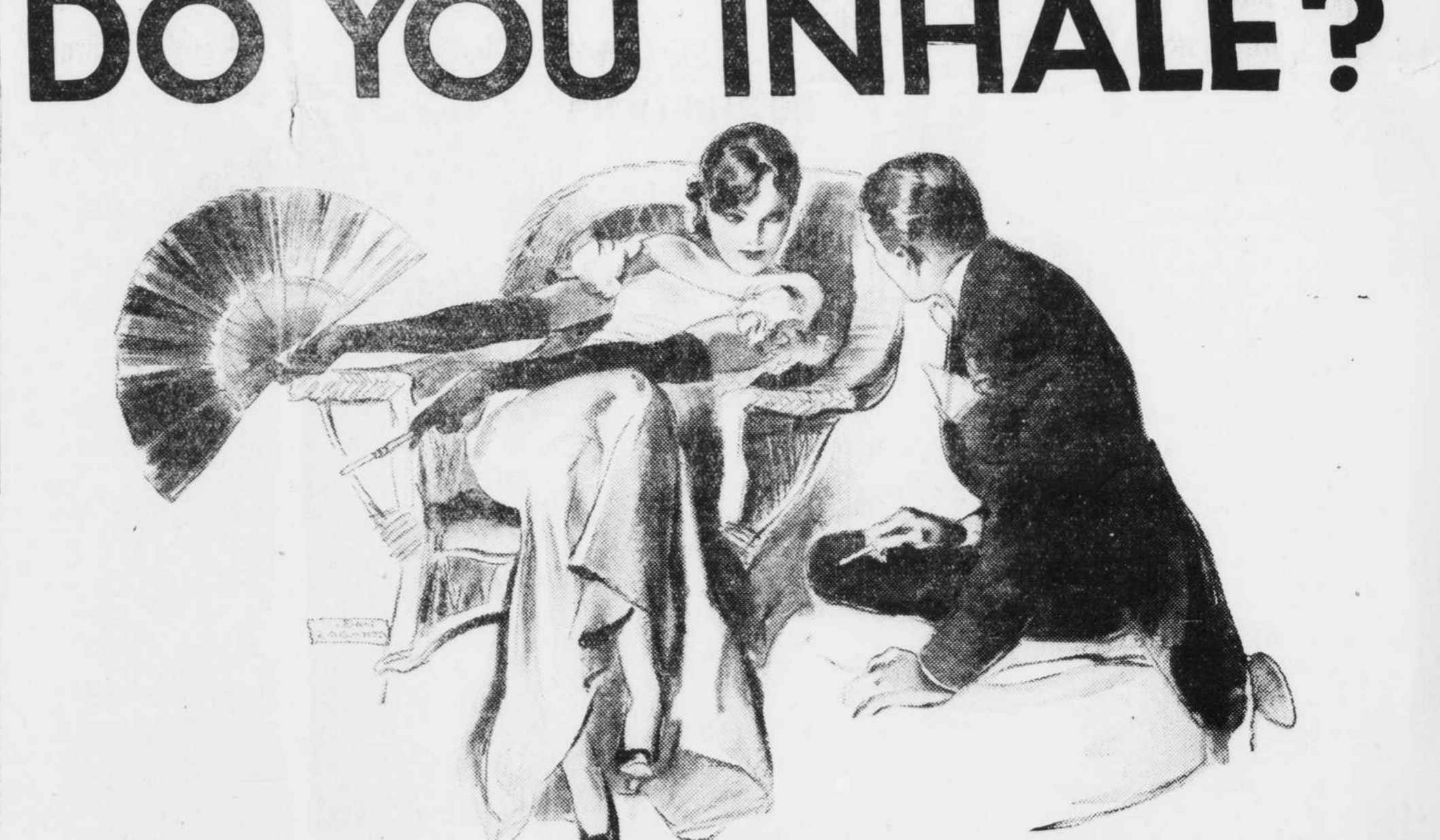
