Winner Of 'Champion Liar' Title Prepares 'Tall Tales' To Hold It

BAY CITY, Mich., June 29. (AP)—Orin W. Butts, holder of the title, "Champion Liar of the United States," is ready to defend it.

He won the distinction at the "tournament of lies" conducted by the Burlington, Wis., "Liars' club," last year.

With three of his choicest "whoppers" already on file with the club and with more than ten months left to polish up others from his store of more than 300 "tall tales," Butts is confident he will be able to hold his title in the 1932 contest.

Butts, 72-year-old veteran of the Michigan pines, won the 1931 contest in a field of 831 rivals.

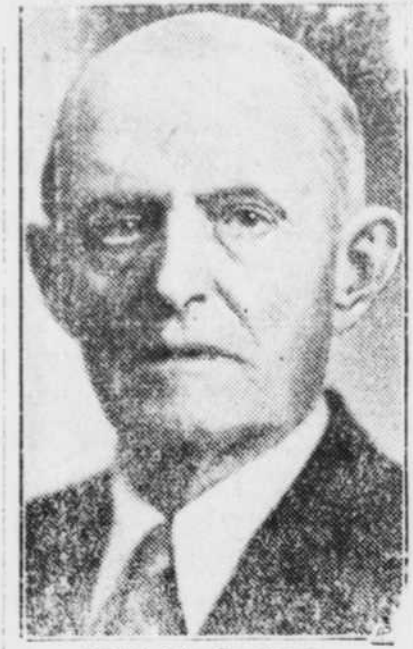
In the 1932 contest Butts will have as one of his opponents a fellow townsman, Reginald William Graham, 73, who, according to his own account, is a very creditable "liar."

Butts says he inherited his yen for tall fables from his father at Medina, N. Y., his birthplace, and developed the talent when he moved to the timber country.

The national title is not the first contest he has won. He is the owner of a medal presented by the Mite society, New York, for winning a "lying contest 52 years ago.

While proud of his championship, Butts says he wants understood that he is not a "white liar."

"When I tell a lie," he says, "I tell a whopper, and everybody knows it's a lie. I never try to lie to anyone about the truth of my lies."

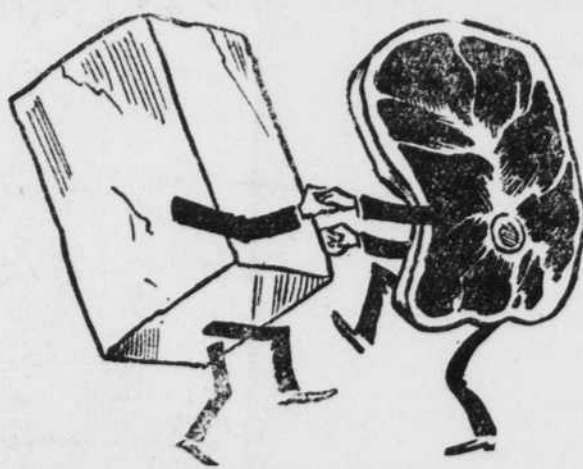
