

# Death Takes C. H. Goumond Sat. Morning

Las Vegas was both startled and grieved last Saturday morning by the news of the sudden death of Charles Harold Goumond, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Goumond.

Death resulted indirectly from an injury received by the young man in an automobile accident in Phoenix, Arizona, about five years ago. In that accident, Harold's chest had been crushed and, notwithstanding the fact that he had made a general recovery from his injuries, his lungs were still weak.

He had been suffering for several days from an attack of ptomaine poison but had so far recovered as to be up and walking about in the vicinity of his home, 424 South Seventh street, the evening before

his death. Because of his physical weakness, his legs became paralyzed and completely collapsed, according to J. N. Van Meter, attending physician.

The funeral, under the auspices of Las Vegas Lodge No. 1468, B. P. O. E., was held at the Elk's Hall Monday afternoon in the presence of a large number of friends. Floral tributes were profuse. The beautiful burial service of the Elk's lodge was impressively carried out by the officers of the lodge, after which interment was had at Woodlawn cemetery.

The untimely death of the talented young man, brings sorrow to a large circle of friends. He was born in Omaha, Nebraska, August 28, 1900. He lived with his parents

for several years in Ely, Nevada. schools of that city and at Staunton Military Academy at Staunton, gaining his early schooling in the Virginia. He later graduated from the high school in his native city of Omaha. He spent several years in Phoenix, Arizona, where he had gone for the benefit of his health, coming to Las Vegas to reside in 1929, shortly after his marriage to Miss Marguerite Duffy of Phoenix.

He was a talented musician having served as leader of the Las Vegas band and also for some time was a member, finally becoming leader of the famous Arcadia ball room orchestra in Detroit. During his residence in Las Vegas he gave freely of his talents to all public

demands.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his widow, one daughter, Margo Marcella, four years of age, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Goumond.

The Age joins with a large circle of friends in extending sympathy to the bereaved relatives and in expressions of regret at the untimely passing of the young man whose life gave promise of fine achievements.
